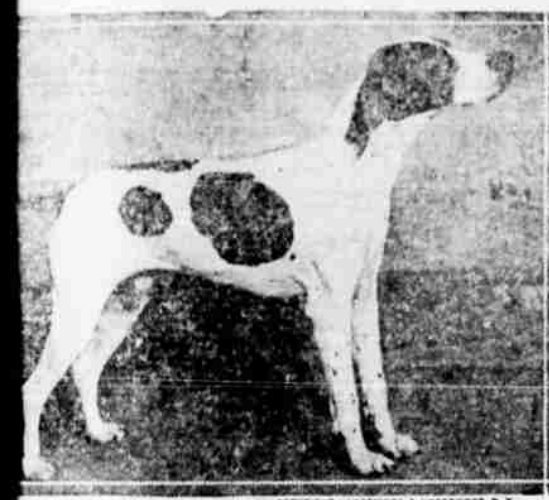

Succeeds Burns As Head Of Investigation Bureau



J. E. Hoover, successor of the famous William J. Burns, at his new desk as head of the Bureau of Investigation of the U. S. Department of Justice, in Washington, D. C. Mr. Hoover was formerly an Assistant Director under Burns, and was a member of the Department's force of secret agents for several years. He has been Acting Director since the retirement of Burns, which followed close on the heels of Attorney General Daugherty's forced resignation. He was officially appointed by Attorney General Stone as Director of the Bureau Monday.

Crusader Of Woman's Rights

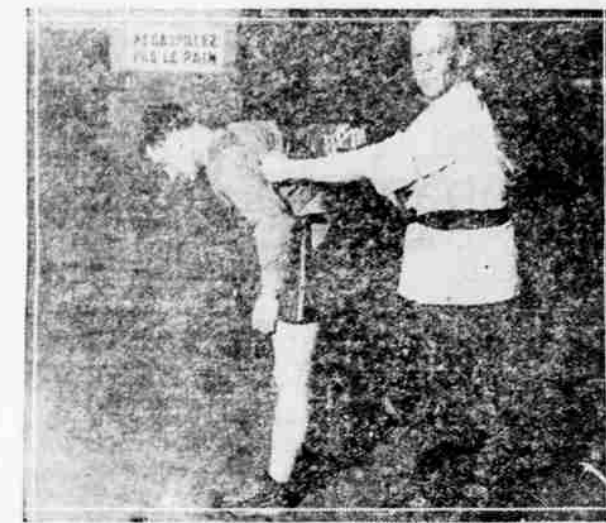

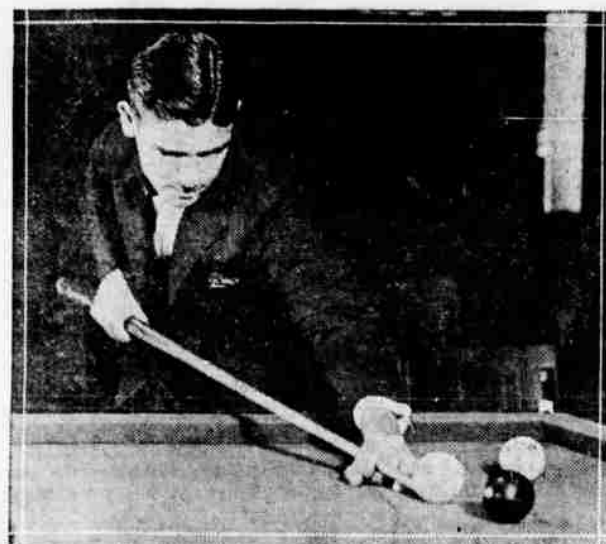
NEW ART OF SELF-DEFENSE

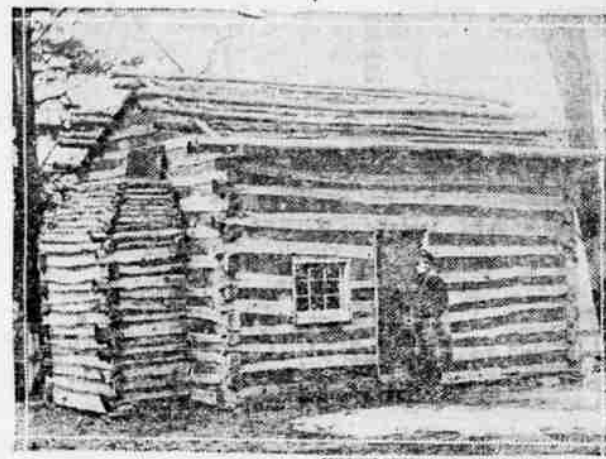
WILL HE BE THE NEW 18.2 BALKLINE CHAMP?
