MUNN LOSES TO ZBYSZKO

PHILADELPHIA, April 15.—Stanislaus Zbyszko, carrying the weight of 50 years on his shoulders, regained the world's heavyweight wrestling championship by throwing Wayne "Big" Munn twice in rapid fire order at the arena tonight.

The Pole won in straight falls, thrilling the capacity crowd by toppling the giant Munn in 8 minutes and 11 seconds with a forearm hold and coming right back and repeating this performance by tossing Munn in 4 minutes and 53 seconds for the second fall with a forearm and hammer-lock.

Eddie Bennett has handled the wooden ware for one club or the other in five of the last six world series. He is the only truly professional mascot in the major leagues of baseball and the only mascot past or present who can waggle a boastful finger at his record.

Eddie, left an orphan at the age of 14, out of a job and out of a home, was hanging around the Polo Grounds when the Yankees inhabited those premises in 1919. The White Sox under Kid Gleason, were making a drive for the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, which, as it turned out, was discovered under the pillows of that hotel in Cincinnati.

The Sox were playing a bargain program with the Yankees and they had lost the first game. Happy Felsch, later to be fired out of baseball with the rest of the Black Sox, saw the kid under the bleachers during the intermission.

"Kid, are you lucky?" Felsch asked him.

"I'm as lucky as a four-ten" said Eddie and Felsch hauled him along to the Sox dugout to chase the bats for the second game. The Sox won it and took Eddie to Philadelphia for the next series, which they won also. They carried him to the end of the season and won the pennant. They would have won the world series from the Reds, too, Eddie alleges, but for the bribery.

The White Sox firm didn't pay Eddie any salary for bringing luck to the ball club that season, but he did pick up about \$20 a week from the players for running errands and fielding their gloves after the games. He didn't lose a bat or a glove either.

In 1920 Eddie landed a job with the Brooklyn Dodgers. They didn't pay him a cent all season and when in the fall they won their pennant, they gave him only \$60.

Worse than that Uncle Charlie Ebbets even refused to take him to Cleveland for the home games with the Indians because the expense of the kid's fare would have been too great.

That finished relations between Eddie Bennett and the Brooklyn Dodgers. The next year he landed with the Yankees. They had never won a pennant until he came. Thereafter they won three in a row and in his fourth season, finished second. Eddie draws pay from the Yankees. He figures that he really rates it and so does Colonel Ruppert who supplies the wages and collected the drag from three world series.

Yesterday's Games In the Big Leagues

After an unanimous opening start of the baseball season, the weather began to crack in spots today which is the usual penalty for the optimism of the schedule makers in trying to crowd the spring time.

The showers of April drenched the Giants and Braves all the way at Boston after three innings of action with the Giants leading 2 to 0. The Indians and Browns didn't even start their game in St. Louis, and the Senators and Yanks delayed in starting because of rain, ran into darkness after six innings. The attendance fell off everywhere after the excitement of the opening ceremonies and even the Senators and Yanks drew no more than 7,969 customers.

Dodgers and Reds Win
Dodgers, Reds and Braves still lead the National league with the perfect figure of 1,000. In the American league the Indians and Athletics occupy the same position, perhaps for the last time this year.

The Dodgers with Rube Ehrhardt pitching, beat the Phils for the second time at Ebbets field, Brooklyn, 6 to 4. Hack Fournier, first baseman of the Brooklyn club, and Benny Myers, coach of the Phils, were tossed out in the fourth inning for fighting.

The Reds won from the Cardinals again at Cincinnati 4 to 2. Adolfo Luque, the Reds' Cuban pitcher, allowed only one earned run, and held the Cardinals to half a dozen well-spaced wallops.

Pirates Come Back
The Pirates, beaten in their first encounter with the Cubs, turned on them today and won 8 to 4. In Philadelphia the Athletics took a second victory from the Red Sox 5 to 3.

The series between the Tigers and White Sox thus far is a stand off for the Sox beat the Tigers 2 to 0 in today's game at Detroit.

Jack Fournier, the Dodger's elderly first baseman and Benny Myers, the Phillies coach, were the combatants. Both were thrown out of the game as soon as they could be pried apart, which took the combined efforts of both teams and a set of umpires.

As this conduct was most unbecoming, especially in the presence of the league president, one or both of the fighters probably will be punished in the region of the wallet by a fine.

Fournier hit into a double play in the fourth inning. As he walked back to the bench Myers said something to him. It was reported that Myers remarked: "You old guys ought to bushel up your whiskers in a hair net. Then you wouldn't get them tangled up in your spikes and you might beat out some of those hits."

SOCIALIZATION OF INDUSTRIES AND BANKS TO BE A BIG ISSUE IN BRITISH GENERAL ELECTION

GLOUCESTER, Eng., April 15.—Issue of a large majority of the Socialization of British Industries and banks will be a major issue in the next general election.

The independent labor party has before it a minority and a majority report from its financial committee. The former commends socialization of banks and industries; the latter desires a transfer of the properties from private ownership to public service. It is practically certain that one of the two will be adopted by the independent labor party, which includes most of the other British socialists, including Ramsay MacDonald and members of his late cabinet.

Between them the committee reports represent the considered opinion to socialism.

UNWRITTEN LAW ARGUMENT GETS PURDY FREEDOM

TULSA, Okla., April 15.—Gene Purdy, the young church deacon who slew E. S. Huchison, wealthy lumberman "because he stole my wife's love" was the hero of Tulsa tonight.

A jury found Purdy not guilty of the murder this morning after Purdy had been on trial two weeks.

Scores of men and women, many of them total strangers, congratulated Purdy on his acquittal and Purdy will return to work in the offices of the Gilliland Oil company, company officials said.

Huchison was shot to death in front of the postoffice last winter.

The young churchman's attorneys held that he killed Huchison after brooding over Huchison's alienation of his wife's affections, causing her to divorce him and still later planning to flee the country with Huchison and take Purdy's two children.

Purdy's counsel plead the unwritten law and temporary insanity. Purdy wept when the verdict was read. It was one of his few emotional moments since he had gone on trial.

Mrs. Helen Purdy the divorced wife was formerly connected with Y. M. C. A. here. Purdy was a deacon in the First Christian church.

BABE RUTH SQUAWKS TO GET OUT OF BED

NEW YORK, April 15.—Babe Ruth's colic has abated so much that he is now kicking the covers from his cot in St. Vincent's hospital and may leave his bed in a day or two. The Yankees probably will arrange some ceremonial trimmings for the day when he turns out again in uniform to take his place in the batting order, and thereby revive trade, which has suffered greatly by his absence.

The opening day celebrated at the Yankee stadium left about one-third of the seating capacity unfilled, and today's crowd seemed to number less than 7,000.

GROWING OF RED CLOVER SEED IS LUCRATIVE HERE

Recent information received from the Oregon experiment station shows that red clover seed is one of the best paying crops in certain parts of Oregon, and particularly in central Oregon. This crop has been demonstrated for seed purposes in different parts of central Oregon, particularly heavy yields being secured in Klamath county. During 1924 over two million (\$2,000,000) dollars worth of clover and other leguminous seeds were imported into the United States from foreign countries.

This should insure a good price for several years to come. A yield of over 500 pounds of seeds per acre has been secured in Klamath county by C. A. Hill, near Merrill. Mr. Hill sowed his clover in June with the grain already well established, seed was sown with ordinary press drill with grass seed attachment, two irrigations were necessary the first being at the time of the grain needed irrigation, the second shortly after. During the second year only two irrigations were necessary in order to secure the proper seed development. Over irrigation would cause a greater growth of stalks and leaves, which undusted for seed purposes. Clover would work in well in rotation with potatoes, grain or sugar beets, and would be a paying crop for nearly all farmers in the irrigated districts, with greater increase cost of harvesting could be reduced as well as a smaller loss of seed in handling.
