LONDON, April 15.—British newspapers are eulogizing John Sargent whose sudden death has shocked the country.

The unique distinction of having single exhibits housed in an entire room at the national museum is recalled as one of the peculiar marks of favor bestowed on Sargent. No other artist ever achieved such distinction until after his death.

So sudden was Sargent's passing that his friends hardly can realize that he is gone. Sir Philip Sassoon called at the Sargent home in Chelsea to pick up his friends for a lunch engagement only to learn that Sargent was dead.

Mrs. Cunningham had been making vague and half whispered suggestions all afternoon that she murdered members of her family. She became garrulous shortly after she had been taken to the county jail on a warrant charging her formally with the murder of her 10-year-old son, Walter.

She talked by fits and starts. The sheriff asked her about the large amounts of arsenic found in her home. "Oh, well," she said, "with all that about the house, maybe I did get a little into their food by mistake."

Discoverer Of New Serum For Scarlet Fever



Dr. Alphonse R. Dochez, of New York, well-known medical investigator, formerly of the Rockefeller Institute, whose Dochez serum was used by Dr. Blake, of New Haven, Conn., who made a spectacular cure of 31 severe scarlet fever cases in 24 hours. The serum is said to be the greatest Godsend to the medical world.

FOKKER STUNS WORLD WITH NEW NEAR CRASHPROOF FAST AIRSHIP

LONDON, April 15.—A fool-proof, near crashproof fast airship, judged by some to be capable of eliminating half the accidents to which passenger airships are subjected, was demonstrated at Crofton. The plane is the work of Anthony Fokker the Dutch designer of the wings that flew for Germany during the war. Fokker demonstrated his plane to Air Vice Marshal Sir Sefton Branker and other experts. Sir Sefton gained his experienced first hand sitting with 5 other passengers and the plane in comfortable limousine body of Fokker's new monoplane.

After riding through Kokker's marvelous demonstration, Sefton said he believed the machine to be capable of reducing accidents at least fifty per cent.

When Fokker had brought his ship to earth, flight lieutenant P. S. Bulman demonstrated a new single seater air force biplane, designed to fly as safely as the larger machine. The difference between Fokker's heavy monoplane and the single seater is that the latter is equipped with devices to produce stability, while Fokker achieved it with design.

The single seater has small auxiliary planes between its main planes which are manipulated by the pilot to correct tendencies to stall. Stalling, that is losing flying plane public confidence is obtained speed—causes most air accidents, the money probably will not be long Fokker's passenger machine post in appearing.

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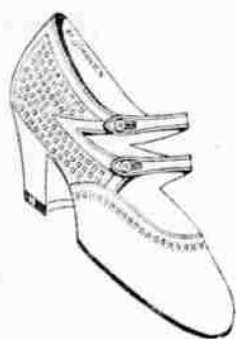
