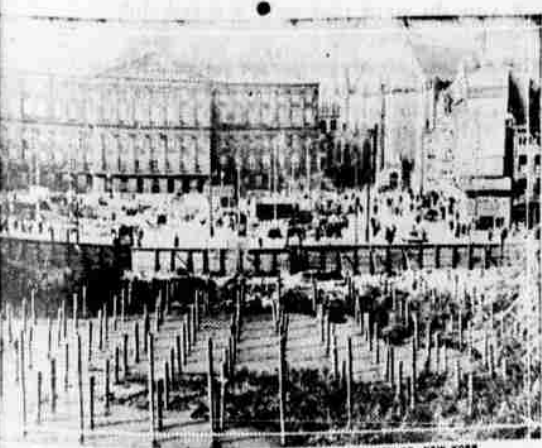
BAND OF MILLICENT ROGERS AT THE RIVIERA
