SENATORS MAKE IT 2 OUT OF 3 FROM YANKS; CINCY RED HURLERS ALL GOING IN MID-SEASON FORM

NEW YORK, April 16.—Remembering that a ball game won or lost in April counts just as much as it would in September, the pennant winning games of 1925 may be in the bag right now with the schedule only three days old, and some of the ball clubs still in a training camp mood.

The Senators, for instance, have taken two out of three games thus far from the Yanks. There have been many cases in which two teams came to the end of the season with less than a two-game gap between the winner and the loser of the symbolic drygoods. It is easy to lose a game in April when the chill is still in the air, and the crowds are slim and silent, and inclined to huddle near the hot dog kennels, but it can never be won back once the official scorer rips out his page and mails it to the president of the league.

Reds Lead

The Cincinnati Reds, whose pitchers are the class of the team, out-ranking the defensive squad, have turned in three earned mid-season jobs in three games with the Cardinals, and the Reds now lead the National league. They will tumble, of course, but when the leaves begin to turn and the boom of the football is heard again intruding on the woe-wow of the ball orchards, these three winnings and the one defeat that the Giants took from the Braves in the opening game at Boston, may decide the order of finishing.

It is always hard for the teams to steady down to their jobs in the early weeks of the season, because the conditions aren't very inspiring and September is such a long way off. In some cases, the managers aren't sure of their line-ups or haven't made up their minds played to date.

TUNNEY READY FOR GO WITH GIBBONS

The Athletics and Indians lead the American league with 1,000. Connie Mack's company beat the Red Sox in Philadelphia for the third time, 7 to 3, and the Indians nosed out the Browns in a close match between pitchers at St. Louis 2 to 1. Uhl gave the Browns five hits and Vangilder held the Indians to 4.

The White Sox are one up on the Tigers now. They beat Ty Cobb's team 4 to 2 in Detroit, which gives the Sox two out of three games day for his fight next Monday with Midget Smith of New York. The fight will be staged in east Chicago.
