

TURNER PLEASED WITH ACTION OF MAYOR ON VETO

Reiterates Previous Statements Regarding An Exclusive Grant

PORTLAND, April 18.—William F. Turner, president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway system, today expressed himself as "highly gratified" to learn that Mayor Goddard of Klamath Falls had vetoed a city council resolution which would have given the Oregon, California & Eastern railway an exclusive franchise in the industrial center of Klamath Falls.

He said the action, as evidence of favorable sentiment toward the Hill lines, would probably have weight with the executive committee of the S. P. & S. when it takes up for consideration the proposed extension of the Oregon trunk railroad from Bend to Klamath Falls.

Should the Klamath Falls council pass the resolution over the mayor's veto, thus reversing the official expression of the attitude of the city, the executive committee would seriously consider the action and might hesitate to proceed on an extension program, he said, reiterating previous statements in opposition to the exclusive Straborn franchise.

In answer to a rumor that he and Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern railway, would go to Klamath Falls soon to discuss the position of the Hill lines, he said no such course had been decided on. Such a trip would not be necessary until after the interstate commerce commission handed down a decision in the central Oregon railroad case, he believes.

Budd expects to be in Portland for a conference next week, it is understood.

**NEW WORLD'S RECORD
