

ARGES MADE WHEELER AIDED SWINDLE

Office Employee Says Counselor Promised to Aid Oil Interest

AT FALLS, Mont., April 18.—Direct evidence linking Senator E. Wheeler, on trial for alleged misuse of office, to permit affairs of Gordon Oil, his client, a Montana oil company, was introduced today by the prosecution.

Clyde Glosser, former chief of Campbell's office here, testified in conversation he overheard between Wheeler and Campbell, Wheeler's attorney, regarding permit obtaining in the interior department in Montana.

Evidence regarding the permits of the government's case, is contained in the indictment which alleges Wheeler illegally exerted his official influence for his client, in connection with the interior department to obtain permits.

Hears Talk

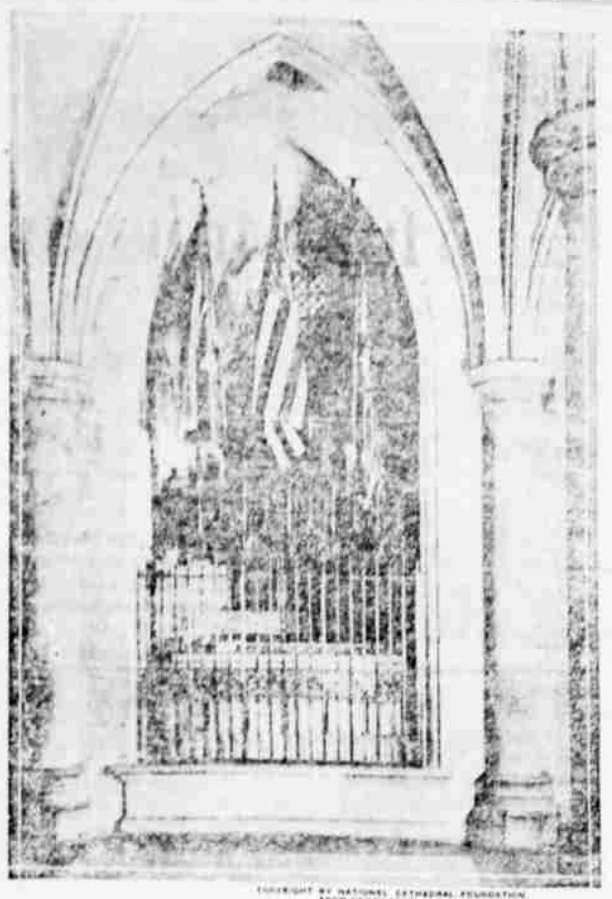
Room in the Rainbow hotel here, Glosser said he heard Campbell and his partner, William Rhea, discuss Wheeler's case. "If you can get this thing (a permit) as the Phil McGowan through down there for me, I can afford to divide up with you."

Just before Wheeler left here, he talked to me more than any one else. He asked me to give him a memorandum on the permit and that he would see it got straightened out," Glosser testified.

Wheeler has since died but he gave me his emphatic testimony before the Borah investigating committee in Washington which absolved me.

Thomas J. Walsh, counsel for Wheeler, brought out on the stand that Rhea, some time ago, during the conversation said he already retained L. V. Hanan, an attorney to handle the case and did not see why he should retain Wheeler. If Campbell advanced such a proposal, why didn't you take it up?" Walsh testified.

Defense Refuse
The defense refused to admit that Campbell, former employee of the interior department, was the head of the conspiracy.



FINAL RESTING PLACE OF WOODROW WILSON COMPLETED IN NATIONAL CATHEDRAL AT WASHINGTON

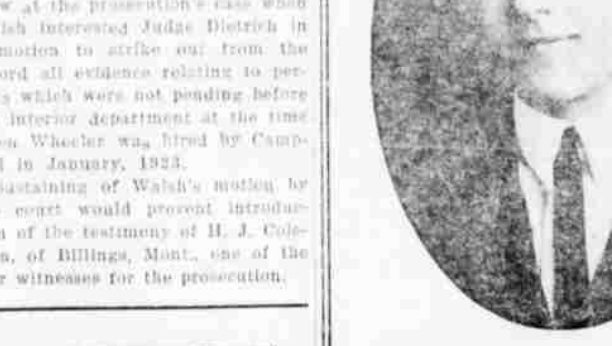
The sarcophagus of Woodrow Wilson within the permanent tomb, just completed in the Bethlehem Chapel of the National Cathedral (P. M.) of Washington, D. C. The sarcophagus is of warm, cream colored limestone, surmounted with a Crusaders' cross and the name "Woodrow Wilson" and birth and death years: "1856" and "1918." Over it is a canopy of beautifully carved dark oak over which are set three historic flags. In the center the American flag that the first U. S. troops carried on their march through London, the first American flag ever saluted by an English king on English soil; on either side the official President's Flags presented to Mr. Wilson by the Government at his two inaugural ceremonies. At the back of the arched niche, 8 feet wide and 18 feet 6 inches deep, in which the sarcophagus rests, is a beautiful interior window of stained glass; in front a fine wrought iron grille of antique design, the bars tipped with crosses.

Defense Strikes
The defense offered a striking blow at the prosecution's case when Walsh interested Judge Dietrich in a motion to strike out from the record all evidence relating to permits which were not pending before the interior department at the time when Wheeler was hired by Campbell in January, 1923.

Sustaining of Walsh's motion by the court would prevent introduction of the testimony of H. J. Coleman, of Billings, Mont., one of the star witnesses for the prosecution.
