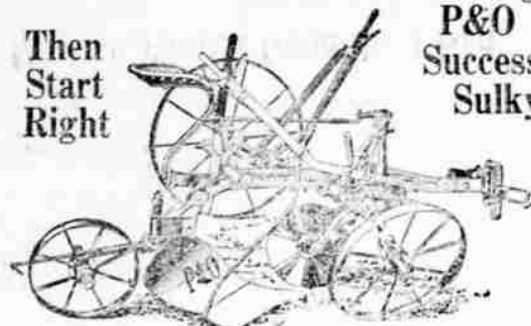

The above stand was adopted by the Klamath County Federated Community clubs in their regular meeting at the chamber of commerce rooms yesterday, and shows a determination on the part of the representatives of the many branches of the federated body to oppose the action of those individuals who are supporting the advent of one railway system into this country, out of several prospective new developments.

With regard to highway development the same organization went on record against the recent proposal of the state highway commission to change the route to Lakeview by turning off five miles this side of Bonanza instead of following the present road, which leads directly through the town.

J. N. Givan and Tom Garrett of Bly were invited to attend the next meeting of the Federated clubs on behalf of the Bly community. Also Lindsey Stenmore was invited to represent the Fort Klamath community.

KLAMATH INDIANS TO GET NEW HOSPITAL

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Four Indian hospitals will be constructed during the coming fiscal year, according to an announcement today by the interior department.

The construction will include: Klamath reservation, Oregon, 49 bed general hospital, \$25,000.

Pyramid Lake, Nev., new hospital and reconstruction of present institution \$30,000.

Fort Peck, Mont., 24 bed hospital, \$25,000.

Fort Lapwai, Idaho, additional structure to care for 59 patients.

Fred A. Baker, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation stated yesterday that construction of a suitable hospital for the care of ailing Indians to be located at the Klamath Agency, had been under consideration for some time, and following the announcement from Washington, actual construction would probably be under way by the middle of the summer.

The institution will take care of all reservation needs and on completion it will not be necessary to send Indian patients to the Klamath Falls hospitals as has been done always in the past. The new institution will be operated under the supervision of a government doctor and every feature of a modern hospital of its class will be provided. The actual design of the building and the arrangement will be settled upon at once and recommendations forwarded to Washington promptly in order that the least possible time be lost in completing the new institution.

Twelve More Cabins For Garich's Camp
