Ford Air Service Inaugurated



FORD OPENS AIRLINE, HERE

The first real step forward in commercial aviation was made when The Maiden Dearborn, the first of Henry Ford's all-metal airplanes, shipped off from Dearborn Field, Detroit, Michigan, laden with a thousand pounds of freight, for Chicago. The Maiden Dearborn was piloted by Edward G. Hamilton, with Harry Russell as mechanic. The plane is the first of a projected fleet of all-metal ships which will maintain a regular air service between Chicago and Detroit. Ford has announced that as soon as the Chicago-Detroit service is in full swing three new services would be started, one to operate to St. Louis, another to Iron Mountain, Mich., and the third to Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minn. Succeeds Father As Gum Head



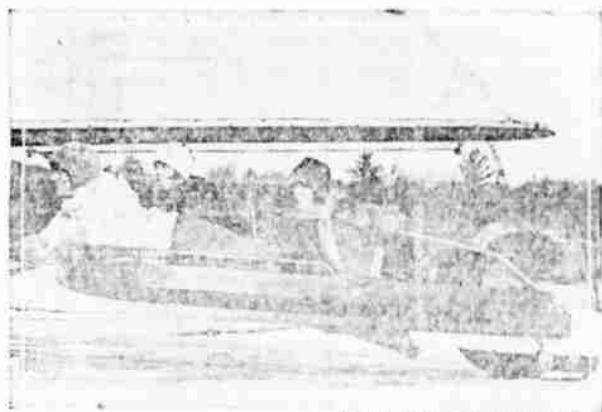

A son, probably potentially one of the richest men in the world, has been born in St. Charles, Ill., to Mrs. Dolora Angell Norris, wife of Lester Norris, a commercial artist. Mrs. Norris inherited the \$200,000 fortune of her late uncle, "Bet a Million" John W. Gates. Judge Ben R. Lindsey, of Denver's Juvenile Court, had a lead of twenty-six in the completed count in connection with ouster proceedings brought by Royal R. Graham, who previously had been declared defeated by the Election Commission. Prince Youssoff, Russian nobleman and one of the saviors of the master mink, Rasputin, suing Joseph K. Widener in New York courts for the return of famous Rembrandt paintings, was charged by a woman's lawyer with attempting to regain the pictures to sell them as a stolen figure. When a baby was born in his family, Gus Fioresetti, a law dancing teacher in New Haven, Conn., but then employed as a stock boy in the New York Stock Exchange, couldn't pay all the bills and his wage was attached. The story reached the ears of Harry Rogers, a Wall Street millionaire broker, who sent him to Regina Gelli, a hostess of the Metropolitan Opera Company, who declared he would be a solo star dancer within a year.

The mysterious guard maintained for several days around the Cheyenne, Wyo., mansion of Governor Nellie T. Ross, by the State Law Enforcement Commissioner, has been just as mysteriously removed. United States Minister Peter Jay, at Bucharest, has pressed the Rumanian Government to open debt funding negotiations with the American Government, to which it owes about \$145,000,000 in principal and interest. If the President must wait for the "advice and consent" of the Senate before removing from office men who no longer have his confidence, a "to let" sign might as well be hung on the White House. Solicitor-General James M. Beck told the United States Supreme Court, in arguing on the dismissal of Frank S. Myers, former Postmaster at Portland, Ore., removed by President Wilson. Plans to cut down the noonday crowds that are allowed to shake hands with President Coolidge, went by the board when the President declared he did not think it an ordeal, but, on the other hand, liked it.

They Would Duel for His Love



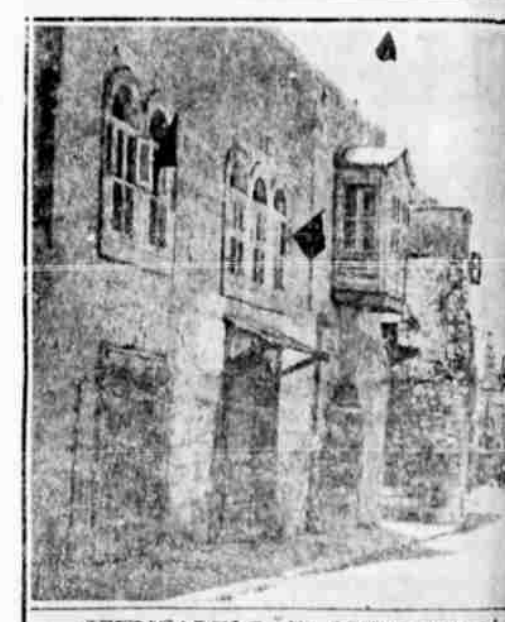
Mrs. Dorothy Kendrick
