BABIES DIE ANNUALLY, THROUGH CARELESSNESS; MAY 1 AS HEALTH DAY

April 21.—Two hundred and thirty babies die each year in the United States before reaching their first birthday it was reported in a report issued by the National Child Health Institute.

The report means that one child in every 13 children born in the United States dies in its first year.

That May 1 will be a child health day in every city throughout the country is emphasized by the report.

Proper conditions hygienic surroundings and prompt medical attention is essential in order to check the present toll of infant lives.

"There are 35,000,000 children in the United States," the report states. "These future children are dependent upon adult intelligence for their well being. They are subject to dangers which exist through neglect and parental carelessness. Adequate health inspection community safeguards against impure water and impure milk, and properly supervised playgrounds in congested city districts will aid materially in the reduction of the infant mortality rate, which now constitutes a national disgrace."
