Here are four men who are prominently mentioned in the present political upheaval in Italy. Antonio Salandra, former Premier, caused a sensation by deserting Premier Benito Mussolini, following the publication of documents that alleged Mussolini knew too much of the murder of the millionaire Socialist Deputy, Matteotti. Signor Amendola is the editor of the anti-Fascist journal "Il Mondo," suppressed by Mussolini. Andrea Torre has been appointed to the Mussolini Cabinet to succeed Salandra. Signor Federzoni, Minister of the Interior in the Mussolini Cabinet, and head of the National Police, is primarily responsible for the action of the Fascist "Black Shirts," as the militia is called.

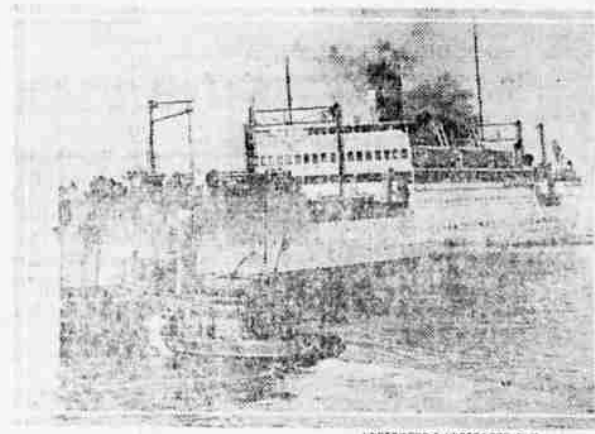

Basil Zaharoff, Europe's "mystery man," and said to be one of the most powerful men in the world, has secured a majority of the stock in the Bathing Society, the facious name under which the gambling Monte Carlo does business. "It was the most charming divorce I ever received," declared Mrs. Jean Nash, the American "best dressed woman in the world," in telling in Paris of her Cairo divorce from Sabat. 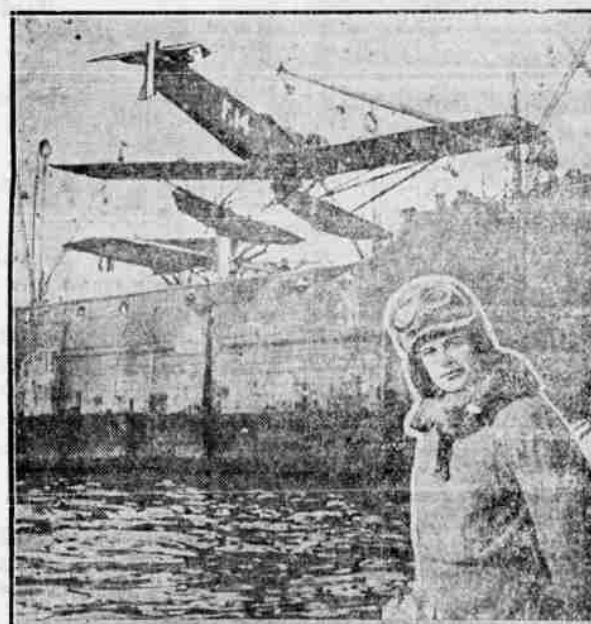
