Get Enough Sleep Says Jersey Doctor

NEW YORK, April 23.—People who sleep less than seven hours a day are "going on their nerve," for sleep not only "knits up the raveled sleeves of care" but it is an important factor in the prevention of its ravelling, according to Dr. Chester T. Brown, of Newark, N. J.

Dr. Brown, who is associate medical director of the Prudential Insurance company, made this statement in a reply to the inquiry: "How much sleep is necessary, and why?"

"It is a mistake to say that every adult should have eight or any other specified number of hours of sleep," he said. "The present day tendency is to under-indulge in sleep and over-indulge in eating and other pleasures. Such unbalanced indulgence does not make for a healthy or efficient people. For sleep is a pleasurable pastime as well as a great healer."

Million Dollars Of Road Work in Oregon To Start

PORTLAND, April 23.—Proposals for \$1,000,000 worth of work were opened today by the state highway commission. The main project was the reconstruction of the pavement on the lower Columbia river highway between Astoria and Svenson, which involves an expenditure in excess of \$250,000.

Among other projects were:

Douglas county—Paving approaches to the R. A. Booth bridge on the Pacific highway north of Roseburg, 0.54 miles of concrete paving.

Douglas county—Gardiner section of the Roosevelt coast highway, .72 miles of grading and 1.74 miles of surfacing.

Josephine county—O'Brien school—George ranch section of the Redwood highway, 8.15 miles of grading.

Lake county—Chalk cliff—Hunter Hill section of the Prineville-Lakeview highway, 8.64 miles of broken stone surfacing.

Awards will be announced by the commission Friday.

Police Trying To Solve Mystery Of Rich Woman Murder

LOS ANGELES, April 23.—Not satisfied with the two arrests already made in connection with the brutal killing of Mrs. Marie Louise Untermyer, wealthy 48 year old widow, police today prepared to round up every possible acquaintance of the slain woman.

The widow's mutilated body was found Wednesday morning on a deserted stretch of road on the Venice boulevard. Near the body was found a bloody club and her empty purse.

Those already under arrest are Luis Valdez, a Mexican, and Stanley Sharp, 27, believed to have been at one time a lover of the slain woman. Police believe that in Sharpe lies the answer to the mystery surrounding slaying. All of last night Sharpe was the center of a third degree examination made by scores of detectives who sought to break down his flat denials of friendship towards Mrs. Untermyer.

He remained unmoved when confronted with letters written to him by the woman. One of these letters in the handwriting of Mrs. Untermyer, according to the police, invited Sharpe to live at her house. Scrawled across the back of the letter ran the sentiment:

"If you love me as I love you, our love can never be cut in two."

This letter was found by police in Sharpe's room.

Valdez was picked up several hours after the body was found. His clothing bore signs of having been stained with blood and hastily washed. His movements are being looked up.

resulting from over-production of potatoes last year, the reports this early indicate an average large crop for 1925.

Of course, forecasts of the fruit situation are necessarily very limited at this time, as cold weather and hail can still do tremendous damage.

The dairymen have been feeling rather blue. Prices have not been so good. There are now indications which give a more optimistic tone. A tremendous cold storage carry-over of butter has been practically cleaned up. With fogs showing a good price, there is a decrease in dairy production, which will probably strengthen dairy prices.
