Mayor W. Freeland Kendrick was the host both to the boys comprising these groups and to two audiences of 4300 persons who heard them. The young musicians were those comprising the Civic Junior Symphony orchestra, the Boy Council Harmonica band and the Civic Junior band. All were under the direction of Albert N. Hoxie.

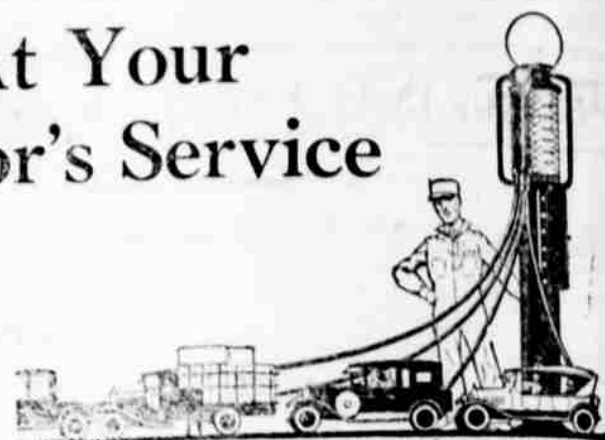

He has also made it possible for a portion of the rehearsals to be broadcast from station WIP.
