"Of course we will have to use chemicals to enrich the soil is ideal; couldn't be better anywhere."

Before nightfall, knowing the banks would not re-open until Monday morning Turner got away with over \$300, it is reported. There may be more money not yet reported.

K. Sugarman of the Sugarman store filed a complaint against Turner yesterday. One of Sugarman's clerks cashed an \$80 check for the man. The sheriff's office is searching for Turner who gave his address as Chiloquin when he opened the bank account.

DRASTIC CHANGES IN CITY PARKING RULES ARE ASKED

Change to Parallel Parking On Main Streets Asked Of Council

The following recommendation for parallel parking and a 30-minute limit on busy streets was handed in to the city council last night by the citizens' traffic committee, headed by John Martin of the Acme Motor Co. Owing to press of other business no action was taken by the council at this meeting and the matter will likely come up for consideration next Monday night.

"The undersigned committee appointed by the various civic organizations of the city, respectfully submit the following report relative to traffic and its regulation in the city of Klamath Falls:

1. Suggested that the east side of Fifth street between Klamath avenue and Pine streets be kept clear for use of the city fire equipment.
2. Suggest parking on Main street from Fourth to Eleventh, and Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth, from Klamath avenue to Pine street with a 30-minute time limit from 7:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m.
3. Suggest spacing along Main street four feet between cars and "no parking" restrictions to be under supervision of the street department.
4. Suggest no parking in front of the theatres during the performances.
5. Suggest parallel parking to be put into effect throughout the city.
6. Suggest taxi cabs be permitted to stand but one car on Main street in front of their places of business. Large cars or buses not to park on Main street or designated streets except when loading or unloading passengers.

J. J. Parker, local manager of the American Express company, appeared before the council to champion the above recommendations. He stated that Klamath Falls had outgrown its old traffic rules.

HEAT DEVELOPS IN COUNCIL ON BUS FRANCHISE

Council Stands By Building Permit Granted To Shell Oil Co.

W. E. Young, president of the Astoria and Linton bus lines petitioning for a franchise to operate on the streets of Klamath Falls appeared before the city council last night and said that four changes that had been inserted in the franchise as passed two readings by the council were seriously objectionable to him.

The principal inserts that had been made without the approval of Young was one which stated that the bus line would hold the city free from any and all damage that might develop from its operations, and another was with relation to the amount of accident insurance the line should carry to protect all concerned.

Young maintained that if an accident occurred through some fault of the city then he should not be held liable, and that he proposed to carry a \$20,000 accident insurance policy here, which was the same required by the cities of Portland, Salem and Boise, Idaho, where he operated lines.

Some heat was developed in the controversy between Young, the mayor, and city attorney. The mayor intimated that there might be a bus line that would agree to do what Young objected to, Young said he wanted the city to show good faith, the city attorney responded at this point, "The city might operate in better faith than you would, you can't tell."

The council did not appear dissatisfied. (Continued on Page Five)

Big Diamond Lake Trout Run Is Just Starting, Says Phil

Phil Moteschenbacher, deputy state fish and game warden in charge of the famous Diamond Lake trout hatchery, was a visitor in Klamath Falls yesterday from the snow-bound resort.

"The lake trout are just starting to run and I will be forced to rush right back to take care of the hatchery work," Moteschenbacher said. "Last year we hatched over ten million fish earning the title of the greatest trout hatchery in the United States, and of the world of course since the artificial propagation of fish is carried out on a more extensive scale in America than in any other country." There is no reason why the coming season should not exceed last year's record.

The trip down was made in one day but it requires two days to go in over the snow according to the warden. The roads will not be open for automobiles before June 1.

MYERS RECOMMENDS CHARGE BE DROPPED AFTER MANN LETTER

Man Is Badly Injured When Team Runs Off

Fred Reiling, a farmer near Olene, will be brought to a Klamath Falls hospital this morning suffering from a punctured lung, broken rib, and his entire outer skin from his chest down to his knees torn away, the result of a strange accident yesterday afternoon on his farm.

Reiling's escape from death was miraculous. He had been dragging his field when something went wrong with the forepart of the dragger. While he was lying down to repair the damage his horses bolted. Reiling grasped a bar on the dragger just in time to prevent him being run over by the dragger and certain death. He was dragged across the turf for 300 yards when suddenly as he was weakening and about to lose his hold the dragger struck a big rock with such force that it sailed into the air, over his body and landed just a few inches away from him.

Dr. Massey rushed to the scene and attended Reiling whose condition was too serious to risk taking him to a hospital last night. While the man's condition is yet very serious, Dr. Massey believes he will recover.

Misunderstanding Alleged To Have Been Through Negligence in Bookkeeping; Van Emon Calls Action Against "Bud" Hasty; No Criminal Intent By Moe.

"Bud" Moe, former manager of the Pine Tree, charged by the George Mann interests of San Francisco with embezzlement of funds while Moe was manager of the local theatre, was completely exonerated of the charges yesterday afternoon in the court of Justice of the Peace Hunsaker, upon the recommendation of Acting District Attorney W. P. Myers.

With that exoneration "Bud" is entitled and should receive among the people of Klamath Falls the same high standing and esteem with which he was held by practically everyone with whom he was acquainted, either casually or personally during the time he has lived in Klamath Falls.

"The action taken in 'Bud's' case was all too hasty, and in my opinion, unjustified," was the comment of "Bud's" attorney, W. C. Van Emon last night, after the case had been dropped.

Lest there be a misunderstanding among the people of Klamath Falls, Frank Cassidy, personal representative of Mr. Mann, owner of the theatre interests bearing his name, stated last night, and The News herewith repeats that conversation: "Harry Poole, present manager of the Pine Tree, had nothing whatever to do with the charges against 'Bud' Moe. They were brought by Mr. Mann himself and Poole signed the complaint only after receiving telegraphic instructions from Mr. Mann himself."

"I have known 'Bud' for years, Frank Cassidy said last night. "He was a capable showman and I am glad to see him freed of the charges."

The following letter was sent to Acting District Attorney Myers yesterday by Cassidy, and it was based on this letter that Myers recommended dropping of the charges.

"In reference to the case of the state of Oregon vs. B. F. Moe, now pending in justice court for Linkville district, Klamath county, Oregon, I desire to state that Mr. B. F. Moe has made full and complete settlement and payment of all accounts or funds due the Pine Tree Theatre, Inc., of San Francisco.

"Mr. Moe has explained the differences in account with our company, which arose over various sight drafts and checks given by Mr. Moe at various times, which he had reason to believe would be honored and for unexpected reasons, were not honored on presentation. Upon investigation we find such drafts and checks were issued by him through the First National bank of Klamath Falls, Oregon. I further find from Mr. Moe's statements which have been corroborated, that some differences in account arose through a misunderstanding and negligence in bookkeeping records on his part. Mr. Moe states that there was no criminal intent to defraud the Pine Tree theatre and we are disposed to accept this statement. Owing to the fact that all accounts have been adjusted satisfactory to the company, and the further fact that upon his arrest, he voluntarily returned to Klamath Falls, we are inclined to believe that there was no criminal intent upon his part and hence would recommend that the criminal proceeding now pending against B. F. Moe, should be dismissed. (Signed)
