farmers to the number of improvements, 1 per cent for improvements and equipment, and 2.5 per cent for the purchase of livestock.

Total loans closed by these three agencies, since their establishment was \$1,675,150,963, distributed among 1,112,933 borrowers. Of this federal land bank loans totalling \$1,067,428 was apportioned among 347,743 borrowers; joint stock land bank loans to the amount of \$514,947 were distributed between 67,002 individuals; and 697,289 borrowers of intermediate credit bank funds received \$91,775,975.

The extent to which the farm loan banks, the joint stock land banks and the more recently organized intermediate credit banks are being used by farmers in this and other states is an indication that these new financing institutions are finding their places in the credit structure of the nation to the well-being of the farmer.

YANKS SLIPPING BEFORE ATTACK OF WASHINGTON

NEW YORK, April 27.—The Yanks were whipped again today, for the sixth time in 11 games, and by the Philadelphia Athletics, whom they once held about as highly as Jack Dempsey holds Joe Beckett. It is not possible to assert whether the Yanks would have won the game with Babe Ruth in the lineup instead of his friend and protegee, Lou Gehrig, who hit a double and fielded his position without an error. But it would be safe to gamble a dollar to a slightly used Roman candle that the Yanks with the Babe at work, would have won more than five games out of eleven thus far.

Ruth has always been the animating agent in the Yanks, and the only time they had to play a considerable stretch of games without him, they were lucky enough to have a full hand of star pitchers in great shape at one time. That was when the Babe served his long spring suspension for barnstorming.

Senators Strong

The Senators have met the Yanks in eight games and have whipped them six times, thereby establishing a margin very early in the season, which in October might span the distance between first place and second. Today the Senators beat the Red Sox 2 to 1, scoring their two in the ninth after Fred Wingfield had held them to seven hits and a shutout. So the Washington team and the Athletics are now tied for the top with eight games won and three lost.

Of course it is still very early in the season to be strumming slow music on the lower register of the harp's chord, but it is apparent that the Yanks are a one-man ball team, and that without that one man they can't win for losing. Most of the pennant affairs of recent seasons have been decided by similar margins, and the one now separating the New York team from Walter Johnson and his colleagues.

The Tigers, who ran so hard for the pennant last season, still defy the odds, and have now lost ten games out of 13. The Browns beat them today 10 to 8. Ty Cobb, after a couple of seasons devoted to development as a manager, is now fighting solely on his merits as a gang boss, and making a bad showing.

White Sox Climbing

The Indians were whipped by the White Sox, 12 to 4, and this was what permitted the Senators and Athletics to go to the top, the Indians being displaced through their defeat.

In the National league the routine has not been disturbed, for the Giants are far out in front. They won from the Phils, 5 to 3, and their standing is now nine games won in 11 played. The Reds and Cubs, who come next, have each won eight and lost five. The Cubs beat the Reds 5 to 2, but the Cincinnati team was hampered again by a recurrence of the epidemic of ills and sprains which defeated its ambitions last year.

The Dodgers beat the Braves 15 to 2.
