GERMANY ELECTS HINDENBERG FOR NEXT PRESIDENT

French Deny They Will Send Protest Against War Marshal's Success

(By United News-Letter Wire) DORTMUND, Holland, April 27.—"I have nothing to say. It means nothing to me," was the only response from former Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany when asked what he thought of Field Marshal Von Hindenberg's election to the German presidency.

BERLIN, April 27.—Germany is rumbling with the echoes of the mighty shouts that welcomed the election of Field Marshal von Hindenberg as president.

A general weakening of stocks on the bourse; virtually unanimous condemnation of the elections result in the union press, and unfavorable comments of foreign statesmen, and the warnings of republican leaders and writers have not been sufficient to quiet the tumultuous acclaim.

Germany is going about her business as usual, and it will require more than blasts of condemnation to persuade her that in electing to the presidency her only remaining unchipped national idol, she has made other than a wise decision.

World Wonders Since the election result was announced in the early hours of Monday morning, the world has been clamoring to know what it meant, and there have been answers from Washington, London, Paris, Belgrade and other western world capitals, but from the temper of many of the millions of persons who voted for Hindenberg it is to be surmised that the answer as they see it has not been stated.

Leaving the fascist, who want war with France, and the monarchists who want an immediate return of the monarchy, out of consideration, the German answer to the world's query, is, in effect:

"It means that we have a roof over our heads, a lock on the door and weather strips on the windows."

The Germans have been accustomed through the centuries to look up to a figure of a certain pattern. It is only since 1871 that they have looked up to the same figure and called him Kaiser. Before that Germans in each of the states, ranging in size from specks to great areas used to look up at electors, margraves, dukes, princes and kings. With such figures above them the Germans obtained a feeling of security, and now they have raised above them the very next best thing—a man identified with the idea represented by their former rulers. For a sense of security the Germans perhaps have traded real security, but on the day after the election those who made the bargain seem to be content with it.

Whether Hindenberg will fill the frame or whether the ideals that elected him finally will recall the monarchy, are the problems before Europe. Monarchists and others who have evaded that party designation, because of the seeming hopelessness of their cause, believe that a new era is dawning for the fatherland. The logic of their argument appears to be excellent, but there is much yet to be discovered about Hindenberg and the real intentions of the German people.

Common men and women from miles around trooped to the castle at Gross Schuwalper, where Hindenberg had retired over the week-end. There were peasants, war-maimed soldiers, junker and the like from villages and farms all around. These joyous people wore their Sunday best clothes, and every man entitled to a medal wore it.

Hindenberg received a continuous ovation from the pilgrims and at intervals there burst from the crowd the stirring "Deutschland über alles."

PARIS, April 27.—France denies any intention to protest the election of Field Marshal Von Hindenberg to the German presidency it was announced at the quai d'Orsay Monday night.

An unconfirmed report had reached Berlin that a French protest was being drawn up pointing out that Hindenberg was on the list of "war criminals." The report apparently was caused by a French official statement earlier in the day regarding Hindenberg's status.

It was said at the quai d'Orsay then that the German president's

name was number 227 on the list of "war criminals" and that he was charged with deportation of French citizens, pillaging, destruction, burning of property and carrying off women and girls. These were but the major crimes charged against him.

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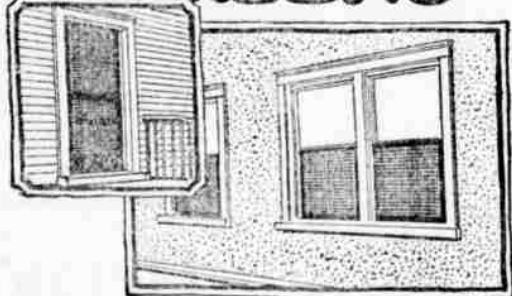
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
