GERMAN RETURN TO A MONARCHY IS FORECAST

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—"Wait and see" is the attitude of this government toward the election of Field Marshal von Hindenburg. Officials see no cause for concern at the moment. They expect no radical change in Germany's policies, because the German presidency is a figure-head compared with the American presidency and second, because von Hindenburg's campaign utterances commit him to the policies of the present German government.

Officials do, however, recognize a trend back to monarchy. The victory of Hindenburg is regarded as a decided step toward restoration of the old regime. Whether Germany later is to go all the way is the big question here. Officials say that a restoration does not necessarily follow because the phenomenon of a complete reaction and a reversal of public sentiment is as frequent in Germany as here and in every other country.

The following are comments made in Washington official circles:

"I don't think so far as economic policies are concerned that the election of von Hindenburg has very great significance. It doesn't follow that investors will lose confidence in German bonds or industrials. The German presidency is not an important authority, as it is here. The main importance of the election is as an indication of the trend of German thought. It was a natural reaction in a country where the tradition of monarchy and loyalty to the kaiser was firmly established for so many years.

"But I don't think it has any significance as to changes of policy. The policies that von Hindenburg has committed himself to are those of the Dawes plan and economic cooperation supported by the present government. It doesn't mean necessarily that there will follow any movement toward restoration now that the election is over, sentiment may wane and change to another direction, as we have often seen it do in our country.

Popular Leader

"There is something in the thought that von Hindenburg is a strong character who has a hold on the imagination of the German people. He may be able to bring unity to the nation. In a sense, it is a step in a conservative direction politically, and I see no threat to economic or political stability.

"I notice that German government seems are down a few points, but I regard that as a temporary reaction. An investor isn't thinking whether it is von Hindenburg or not, but whether there is going to be economic stability and whether German industries are going to continue.

"Of course, it isn't what France would like to have seen."

That was the most definite comment that could be contained from any responsible source.

Going behind the actual words of officials here, it is apparent that every one is disposed to put the best possible face on what has happened. The government naturally could not interfere in the internal political affairs of a friendly nation. But unquestionably it would rather have seen some one else selected than one of the chief military figures of the kaiser's regime. Bankers certainly would have felt easier. But the thing is done, and officials here are not disposed to make it worse by showing ill temper.

Watchful Waiting

They are waiting to see what happens. They hope that when von Hindenburg takes office in a few days, he will make a statement of policy that will show a sincere desire to abide by all treaty pledges and a disposition to work, rather than fight. They hope that he will carefully avoid sabre rattling.

There is a general fear that any fragile chances of a second disarmament conference that remained have been blasted, for it is regarded as certain that France will be more determined than ever to keep her powder dry until she knows what is going on across the Rhine.

Down at the bottom of a good many minds here there is a brooding apprehension that the war is not over yet. The last war was the sequel of the Franco-Prussian war fifty years before, and you can find a good many students of international affairs who fear that the last war will have its sequel, too, some years hence.

Post-war Germany has been an anaemic, shell-shocked affair, so prostrate that its former enemies banded together and propped it up with the Dawes plan. Now with the

election of one of the great popular German war heroes, it is natural for outside nations to fear that the first move toward restoration of the kaiser has been made, that civil war in Germany will soon be getting off the sidewalk for officers and that a little later one of the Kaiser's grandsons will be riding up to Potsdam palace. It is these future possibilities, rather than any immediate effect of Hindenburg's election, that causes concern.

Good Will Between France and Germany Is Very Doubtful

BERLIN, April 28.—A stronger attitude toward France probably will be the only significant change in German policy as a result of the elevation of the old war lord, Field Marshal von Hindenburg to the presidency.

The country is filled with rumors of a civil war, of military coup d'etats, of a possible economic collapse and other alarming prospects, but these are discounted.

As for the Dawes plan, and Germany's reaction toward it under nationalistic impulses, that the United States learns that the members of the Dawes commission view the situation with more or less equanimity. They are not impressed with Hindenburg's own suggestions that the Dawes formula should be altered.

It is estimated that more than \$20,000,000 is invested in the United States alone in plants for extracting various gases from the air for commercial or scientific purposes.
