

FRIENDSHIP OF U. S. AND GREAT BRITAIN STRONG

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Because of recent developments, the statement of Sir Kene Howard, the British ambassador that Great Britain welcomes good will between the United States and distant sections of the empire, is significant. It is another evidence of the partnership that is developing between the two English-speaking powers—unwritten but none the less real and potent.

"There seems to be an idea afloat," said Sir Howard in an address to the Canadian club here, "that we in Great Britain look askance and with some anxiety at any closer relationship between the other partners in the British empire and this country. It is possible that there may be some foolish—very foolish people—who do so. I cannot answer for all the short-sighted people in the world. But, believe me, the great mass of the British people are glad at all signs of growing confidence and good will between all parts of the British empire and this country."

Bond Stronger

"We have complete confidence in the absolute good faith of the government of this country, and in the friendship of the great mass of the people of this country. The bond between us is all the stronger because it is a voluntary bond, a simple straight-forward bond as between friends. The greater the friendship, therefore, not only between the Britishers of Great Britain and the United States, but also between the more distant parts of the great British commonwealth and the United States, the better we are pleased."

While the American relations with the Irish free state, which maintains a minister here, may be considered within the scope of the ambassador's remarks, the address is significant rather because of Canada, Australia and New Zealand. The American fleet, now maneuvering in the Pacific, is about to leave on a friendly invitation cruise to Australia. The effect of this is not being lost on Japan, Canada and the United

States are being drawn closer together by such agreements as that regarding the St. Lawrence waterway.

Japan Alliance

The unwritten, largely spontaneous collaboration between the United States and Great Britain has been gradually gaining strength and received its greatest impetus when Great Britain refused to renew her alliance with Japan at the Washington arms conference.

This accord was further developed by Great Britain's action in being the first to start paying back her war debt to the United States, and again this week by the close cooperation between American financial powers in undertaking to help the British pound back to par.

One of the arguments advanced in parliament by those seeking to foster the great Singapore naval base is that it would be useful to the United States in event she was engaged in a Pacific war.

The two powers constitute a sort of international Damon and Pythias. The British dominions carries the working friendship into the second generation, internationally speaking.

Two Calif. Youths Sentenced to Hang

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—With a vase of wilting, purple flowers of death, decorating the bench before him Judge Keetch sentenced three youths to death today.

The boys are: Edward Montijo, Tom Bailey and Lewis Perry, convicted of the murder of Glenn Bond, a policeman, during an attempted bank hold-up. They will be hanged July 10 at San Quentin prison.

INJUSTICE TO GERMANY STILL EXISTS—LUTHER

BERLIN, April 29.—Chancellor Luther has pledged Germany and President-elect von Hindenburg to peace and has put the next European move up to the allies with demands relative to the occupied areas and allied disaffection regarding Germany's disarmament.

The chancellor's speech today made within 24 hours of his interview with Hindenburg, can be read as a statement of the veteran soldier's policies. Not until the allies withdraw their troops and technicians from German soil can Europe begin real moral, political and economic reconstruction, Luther warned the world.

Throughout the speech there was an under-current of stiffening determination to seek what Berlin regards as justice from the allies, while simultaneously endeavoring to ensure the peace of the old world by pushing the security pact to conclusion.

"The injustice done to Germany still exists," Luther told his business men hearers. "We have waited for nearly three months and a half for substantiated justification of the non-evacuation of Cologne, which the allies promised but did not produce. The government often has pointed out the incompatibility of applying reprisals without allowing Germany to justify herself nor to answer the accusations brought against her."

"We are compelled to expect that the allies will hesitate no longer to terminate the present state of affairs. The necessity for quick evacuation is not solely a German affair; the whole of Europe suffers from the delay."

"Germany's efforts with regard to the security question are intended to assist the solution of Europe's problems. Germany is entitled to demand safety because she is disarmed. She has all the more reason to protect herself through a treaty against future attacks since she desires to conduct no war and as every real expert knows, can conduct no war."

BIG COMMUNIST PLOT AGAINST BRITAIN FOUND

LONDON, April 29.—Scotland Yard has parried the first effort of a terrorist bomb squad to invade Great Britain from Europe.

Working on a tip received from the Austrian legation, the Scotland Yard operatives from the so-called special branch discovered that an international communist group with headquarters in Vienna was preparing to assassinate Austrian Chancellor, foreign secretary in the conservative government.

Both the foreign office and Scotland Yard refuse to comment on the plot, although it is known that "necessary steps" have been taken for Chamberlain's protection.

During the long months of violent Sinn Fein agitation, Scotland Yard evolved the special branch to cope with just such emergencies as the European terrorist outbreak is likely to produce. Until some months after the Irish treaty was signed cabinet officers were heavily guarded as a matter of routine. Two special branch operatives now are assigned to each minister and pending the dissipation of the present threat, Chamberlain's home will have additional guards about it.

TOKYO, Apr. 29.—Japan is investigating a speech alleged to have been delivered by the new soviet ambassador to Japan in which he said the Russo-Japanese treaty was a scrap of paper useful only in converting Japan to communism.

An eastern chemical company will equip a steamship as a laboratory to experiment in obtaining useful chemicals from the waters of various oceans and seas.
