BRAVES OUTHIT BROOKLYNS WHO SLIP DOWNWARD

The record of the Brooklyn Dodgers for the season thus far has shown graphically what a few months' time and minor changes in lineup can do for a first class baseball team. The runners-up of last year slipped into the second section of the National league percentage chart today when the Boston Braves pushed them down below the Phillies into fifth place.

Although the Dodgers drew on their pitcher reserve to the extent of four moundmen, the Braves put over 17 hits and bunched five runs in the sixth and four in the ninth, winning 10 to 3. Jess Barnes went all the way for the Braves, allowing 12 hits, but holding effectively with men on bases.

It was a dreary day throughout the entire major league circuit, with rain falling on four diamonds, and cold interfering with business on a fifth.

In the National league New York was the only dry spot. The Phillies even with the Giants in their series at the Polo Grounds, beating the champions 13 to 9 in a loose struggle during which the Philadelphians used four pitchers, and the New York team called to the mound three.

Chicago and Cincinnati; Pittsburgh and St. Louis were rained out.

St. Louis lost at Detroit, 5 to 8, in the only show put on in the American league. Games between New York and Philadelphia and Cleveland and Chicago were postponed because of the showers. The Washington game at Boston did not materialize due to chilly atmospheres.

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—Miller Huggins, manager of the New York Yankees, has given up hope of having Babe Ruth back with the team until another month or perhaps six weeks.

"We may have to make the western trip without the Babe, according to information I have received," Huggins said. "There seems to be an opinion that we are covering up something on Ruth, and that he is in a more serious condition than has been admitted, but that is not so."

Huggins does not believe the Yankees have blown up completely. The team's condition thus far is due to bad breaks, he says.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 29.—Pietro Bordino, speed king from Italy, will compete in the Indianapolis motor speedway races May 30. Officials announced today that Bordino has entered an Italian Fiat. He is the fifth foreign entry for this year's 500 mile classic.

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—While Paavo Nurmi, champion runner, looked on, Johnny Weismuller, king of swimmers, defeated Sam Kahanomoku in a 50-yard dash, but failed to beat the world's record of 22.5 seconds, held by Duke Kahanomoku, Sam's brother. Weismuller's time was 23.25. He beat his opponent by one stroke.

MILFORD, Del., April 29.—A noble old campaigner passed out when Harry J. S., once the world champion trotting stallion, dropped dead at the Stockle farm, Tuesday afternoon. Harry J. S. was valued at \$25,000 at his prime, and after he left the track he was pensioned by the late Harry J. Stockle, the wealthy Wilmington brewer, who owned him.

NEW YORK, April 29.—The lightweight tournament to identify Benny Leonard's successor, will be revived on May 18, with two bouts at the Queensboro club, an open air plant in Brooklyn. Sammy Mandell of Illinois will fight Jimmy Goodrich of Buffalo, and Benny Valgar, the New York shadow boxer, will meet Solly Seeman, also of New York.
