PROMOTER PATTERSON GOES TO FRISCO TO LINE UP BIG STRING OF FIGHTERS FOR KLAMATH BOUTS

Fight promoter J. E. Patterson left yesterday for San Francisco, where he will look over the fast ones with a view to coming to terms with the best that can be had from the southern regions, to scrap in Klamath Falls in the next fight bout after the big affair Tuesday night.

The card Tuesday will be provided with both wrestling and boxing, to catch the eye of both those lovers of the game. And what a card it promises. Twenty-eight rounds are on the card in the boxing line.

Two of the bouts will be the headliners. It will be up to the fans to pick the premier bout of the evening in this card.

There is big Jack Crim, the fighting Medoc who will swap blows with Kid Reagan of San Francisco. Little is known of Reagan here, but leave it to a promoter of Patterson's calibre to match a good man with Crim. Crim has appeared in the two previous cards here and has won a well merited reputation of putting in his best legs always.

Iron Man Felix Torres of Weed, who gave such a good account of himself, and whom many of the fans thought should have had a draw with Crim in the last card, will be given a chance to increase his popularity here by seeking Kid Harris of Albany, all over the ring. Harris is a fast boy and this bout should be a peach from the word go.

MARINE RESERVE TO AID SHIPPING OF U. S. PLANNED

WASHINGTON, April 29.—As a new form of limited aid to American ship owners replacing the rejected ship subsidy, Chairman O'Connor of the shipping board will recommend to congress establishment of a merchant marine reserve. American seamen serving on American ships would be paid a monthly retainer from the treasury.

This retainer will be sufficient to absorb the difference between wages paid sailors on foreign ships and those on American vessels, and in this way will aid American owners who are handicapped now because of the higher wages they must pay. O'Connor says also that it will promote transfer of government ships to private owners.

O'Connor's aim, beside that to aid American shippers to overcome present handicaps, is to attract Americans to man American ships. O'Connor described his new plan as an "Americanization" plan.

Before making it public today, he submitted it to President Coolidge. He declined to give the president's opinion, but pointed out that Mr. Coolidge had consented to its publicity.

Monthly Retainers

The monthly retainer to each American sailor will amount to about \$20. After the present government fleet is in the hands of private American owners the monthly payments from the treasury will total about \$5,000,000 a year.

This plan of O'Connor's is the first definite result of recent indications that some form of ship subsidy would be revived in the next congress by the administration. O'Connor said it would be his principal recommendation to congress, and he had no intention of reviving the old ship subsidy, offered by President Harding and turned down by congress, which provided for payments to American shipowners on a mileage basis. He said that this was his plan, and that it had not been submitted to the other members of the board as yet. Submission of this plan at this date, with O'Connor's comment, indicates that the shipping problem will be brought squarely before congress by the administration for some definite policy.

COOLIDGE IS ASKED TO BE AMHERST HEAD

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Friends of President Coolidge are suggesting that he become president of Amherst college when he retires from the white house, whether he be in four or in eight years.

He could, they say, return to his alma mater and serve it in a useful capacity, befitting the dignity of an ex-president of the United States. His most intimate friend, Frank W. Stearns, is an Amherst trustee, who, because of his personal fortune, has considerable influence in the college's affairs, and could see that the presidency was tendered if Coolidge would accept it.

500 ASK TO BE INVITED TO 3 BOYS EXECUTION

OSSENIO, N. Y., April 29.—More than 500 persons have written Warren Lewis E. Lewis of Sing Sing prison, to apply for the privilege of being present at the triple electrocution Thursday of Morris and Joseph Diamond and John Farina.

The trio were sentenced for complicity in the slaying of John Barrow and John McLaughlin, Brooklyn bank messengers, in 1923.

Not since the electrocutions of the four gunmen in the famous Rosenbath case have so many requests to witness the death of condemned men been received, according to Lewis. Practically every politician in the state, Lewis declared, seems to have a "friend" who would like to view the legalized killing.

Only twenty persons aside from newspaper men, according to the

law, may witness the affair. Lewis' representatives have been taken to court to prevent the crowd from breaking the law by taking their own way. A guard that has been placed outside each cell in the death house, and even newspapers have been withheld from the news. But in spite of the preparations for the execution, Lewis and Farina, the second slayers of two of the men who are to die, have not given up hope of saving their brothers. Lewis visited the death house today, telling her brothers that Governor Alfred Smith would not permit them to go to the electric chair Thursday night. Farina Diamond was in Albany, continuing her attempt which has lasted for nearly 15 months, to have her brothers released from their death sentence.

FLAPPER BRIDE IS ACCUSED BY HUBBY OF THROWING ACID

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—With the ugly scars of acid burns turning livid under his bitter indictment of his young wife, Darby Day Jr., millionaire Chicagoan today faced the secrets of his brief married life before court room spectators with curious women.

Day accused his young wife, Bertha, with deliberately throwing the contents of a vial of acid in his face on February 22, last, at his mother's Beverly Hills home.

The trial has attracted an unusually large crowd of spectators, mostly women, who have come to hear Day relate the intimate story of this tempestuous life with Bertha, his "flapper bride."

Trouble started two days after their elopement and marriage in Chicago, Day testified, when he discovered that his bride was under the influence of liquor.
