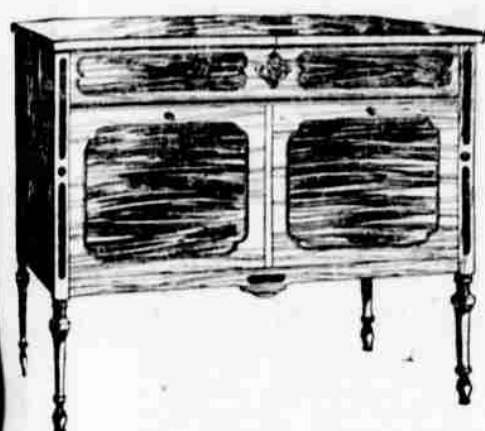

HAWAII NO LONGER KEY TO THE PACIFIC, SAYS FORMER ASST. HEAD OF AIR SERVICE AFTER BATTLE

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Hawaii is no longer the key to the Pacific, according to the deductions drawn from the naval maneuvers by Col. William Mitchell, former assistant chief of the army air service, and center of the recent congressional aircraft investigation.

The vital point, he said, is not Hawaii, but the Aleutian Islands, off the tip of Alaska.

"Modern air strategy has taken away the importance of Hawaii in the future defense of the Pacific," Col. Mitchell said before engineering students at George Washington university here.

"When you think of the Pacific in future wars," he explained, "think of an isosceles of equal-sided triangle, with one angle in the Aleutians, one in Hawaii and the other toward the west coast of South America. The angle in the Aleutians will be the strategic point. Whoever controls that will control the Pacific."

The battleship of the future, Mitchell said, will be little more than a combined submarine and airplane carrier. When she has unloaded her flock of airplanes she'll slip silently under water and let

the planes do the fighting. The price of one battleship and its necessary subsidiaries—torpedo boats, cruisers, destroyers—would buy 4,000 airplanes, according to the former assistant air chief. Each twenty of the 4,000 airplanes, with an airplane carrier base, would defend a radius of 4,000 miles.

Germany, if she had been allowed to continue aircraft construction, Mitchell said, would have been far ahead of the rest of the world in aircraft progress at this time. Before the World war, he said, she had transported 200,000 passengers by air without an accident.

He predicted 100 hours travel from New York to Australia, down the western continent to the lower end of South America, and thence across only 500 miles of water to Australia. This will be an air development of the near future, he said.

Postoffice department air mail fliers, he said, have rendered man inestimable service to the development of air progress in America. This has been done under "intelligent direction" in the postoffice department with old war planes not really suited to the mail service work.

Grandson Of President Harrison Sentenced For Check Forgery

LOS ANGELES, April 30.—William Henry Harrison Burnett, great grandson of President Harrison, was sentenced to four months hard labor with the county road gang, when he pleaded guilty to check forgery.

Burnette is asserted to have cashed the checks so that he could entertain motion picture "extra" girls on trips to the Mexican border.

The forgery charges grew out of a complaint by his wife, charging him with failure to support their child.

Former Klamath Indian Delegates Gets Divorce

Edwin Wilson, former Klamath Indian delegate to Washington and son of Hunter Wilson, who was one of the Indian leaders for his tribe at the time the famous treaty was signed between the Klamaths and the United States government in 1864, was granted a divorce from his wife Pearl Wilson and he was also given the custody of their four minor children. Mrs. Wilson sued for \$10,000 alimony and the custody of their four minor children and failed in both of her claims, according to a divorce decree handed down by Judge A. L. Leavitt, E. B. Ashurst representing Mr. Wilson and Frank L. Mars, Mrs. Wilson.

Father Of Coolidge To Go In Hospital

BOSTON, April 30.—Colonel John C. Coolidge, father of President Coolidge, arrived here tonight from his home at Plymouth, Vermont, to undergo treatment at the Massachusetts general hospital. Col. Coolidge was accompanied by his physician, Dr. A. M. Cram of Bridge-water, Vermont.

The president's father will enter the hospital tomorrow for a general examination, and to undergo treatment for his heart. Dr. Cram said his condition is not serious.

Although he was in fine spirits when he arrived here, Col. Coolidge has been in poor health since he returned home after attending the inauguration in Washington last March. Some time ago it was rumored here that he planned to come to Boston for medical observation, but this report was denied by several of his closest friends.

Hope Abandoned For Ship And Its Crew

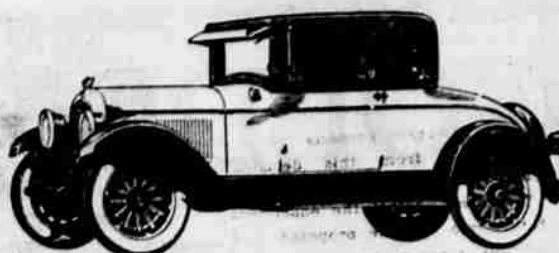
