Goldnick, county agent for the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children. "It makes a difference in the family budget," says Goldnick in his annual report "on the head of the average family pays 50 to 75 cents for a drink of bad liquor, as against five cents a glass for beer in pre-prohibition days."

HOOD RIVER, April 30.—The hunt for former Deputy Sheriff Jones of Klamath county, who on Tuesday evening took Mrs. Helen Baler away from officers, was close to an end tonight. Late this evening the couple was traced to the edge of a canyon in the Dukes valley district. The posse closed in to the rim of the canyon and ascertained definitely that the man and woman had gone down into the canyon.

With the brush almost impassable, the deputies realized that the couple would be forced to remain in the canyon at least until daybreak Friday. A number of ranchers were posted to remain on watch. The officers are confident that after a night spent in the chilly canyon the couple will be ready Friday morning to surrender.

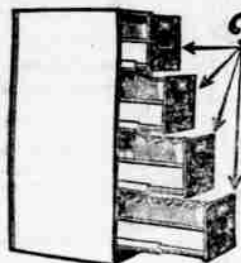
