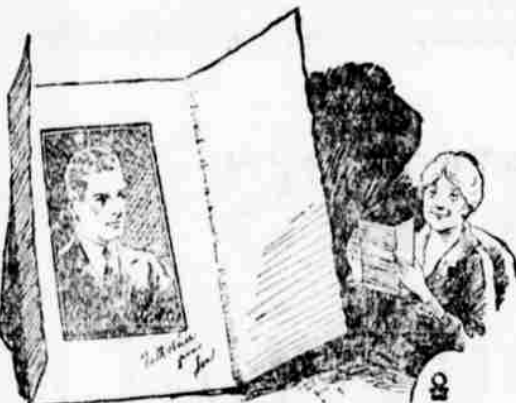

GARY MURDER IS WITHOUT A CLEW

GARY, Ind., May 2.—Gary police tonight virtually gave up the theory that the Chesterton murder victim was Mrs. Josephine Desiderio, 23 of Gary, although they have not been able to locate her. Miss Florence Kish, of South Bend, Ind., a chum of Mrs. Desiderio, told police she believed the woman and her husband are in Detroit.

A dentist also told police that he had a chart of Mrs. Desiderio's teeth and this chart does not correspond to the teeth of the victim. Scores of clews and tips have been run down without discovery of a definite lead to the identity of the murder victim. The remains were found three miles from Chesterton late Sunday. The legs and one arm were missing, apparently smashed off by the slayer or slayers. The torso was saturated with gasoline and badly burned.
