SHEEP PRODUCTS AS FOOD SMALL MORE BEEF, PORK

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The aver-
age Britisher eats seven times
as much mutton and lamb as the
average American.

But that doesn't mean that the
British are lighter meat eaters. It
means that the American appetite
prefers beef and pork to mutton.

In fact during the past five years
the per capita consumption of mutton
and lamb in this country has
dwindled to an extent that it is now
less than a tenth that of beef, and
on an average about one-fiftieth of
pork and considerably less than that
of veal. The striking differences in
the food habits of the American
and British is shown in the fact
that last year mutton and lamb
constituted only 3.25 per cent of
the total meat consumption in the
United States as compared with 22
per cent in Great Britain, according
to figures compiled by the depart-
ment of agriculture.

"Were the people of the United
States," the department says, "to
eat as much mutton and lamb pro-
portionately as those of Britain do,
it would be necessary to increase
our production seven-fold. In other
words, the present production
would have to be augmented by
over 3,000,000,000 pounds of mutton
and lamb annually."

Last year's consumption of mutton
and lamb in this country is es-
timated to have been 5.2 pounds per
person as compared with 88.8
pounds of pork, 62.6 pounds of beef
and 8.3 pounds of veal. The de-
partment of agriculture offers no
explanation for the condition ex-
cept that Americans prefer beef
and pork cuts to lamb and mutton.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—When

For cheap taxi fares have van-
quished the Palace hotel bus, and
according to the management but
service to and from ferries and rail-
road stations will not be maintained
hereafter.

According to Manager Eddie Rob-
erts, the fare charged for bus ser-
vice, while more than it costs two
persons to ride in a taxi, is not suf-
ficient to pay the wages of the bus
driver to say nothing of upkeep
and gasoline.
