DARROW GIVES 3 CAUSES OF CRIME

CHICAGO, May 2.—Clarence Darrow, aged and brilliant lawyer, whose success in saving Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, youthful millionaire murderers from the rope is indirectly blamed for Chicago's epidemic of murders, today told the United Press that it is within the power of public to curb crime.

"It is silly to say that the Leopold-Loeb case has encouraged murder," Darrow declared.

"The present murder era results from three prime causes, all of which are in the power of the people to correct.

"The three prime factors are: The brutal state of mind resulting from the wholesale flow of blood in the great war; the undue publicity given by the press to brutality; a radically wrong system of public education."

VICTORIA, B. C., May 2.—An ancient mariner was ready to sail out of port here late today, bound for England via the Panama canal, in a 25 foot sloop.

LARKSPUR KILLS BIG CARNIVAL MANY SOUTHERN SHOW COMING OREGON CATTLE HERE MAY 10

PORTLAND, May 2.—Poisonous larkspur in southeastern Oregon has caused death to hundreds of cattle in that district, according to Stanley G. Jewett, inspector of the United States biological survey, who returned from a trip through that territory.

The heaviest losses in cattle have been on ranches south of Steins in uplands to the Nevada boundary where Jewett declared he counted 60 dead animals on a 30-mile stretch of road.

In attempting to combat the poisonings, several cattlemen are driving herds southward. According to Jewett, one herd of 2000 head was driven to Nevada this week.

Cattlemen often use sheep to fight the larkspur, which is the same variety as that found in the Willamette valley. Sheep are immune to the plant. Bands of the animals often are used in ridding large sections of the plant.

According to Jewett, there is little chance for recovery after cattle have eaten larkspur. Bleeding is sometimes resorted to with some success, however. The animals become weak, stagger about and suffer paralysis of the respiratory system.

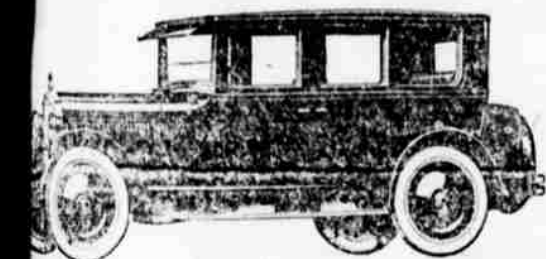
