BOXING AND MAT CARD PROMISES TO BE A CORKER

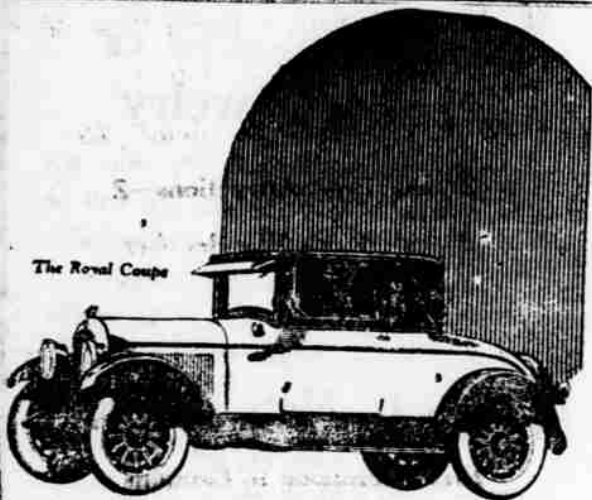
25 Rounds Scheduled For Tonight At Scan. Hall Arena

Glover expects great things of Street, and next Sunday's game should give the Pelican manager a change, to put the double O on him when he pitches to Pelican batters.

Red Watts played a good game at second Sunday. He scored 4 runs and got a net two-lagger. He made a clean steal too, to show he was an all-around ball player.

"Cap" Mathews has just about landed first base. Mathews can play any position in the game. He caught the first five innings Sunday with a bad leg and didn't make a bad showing at all. Matty will play second if Glover alters his plans.

Ed Clarke, a mighty good slugger, good first baseman and putfielder was among those present in the grandstand. Clarke has a severe cold but will be in the game ere long. Clarke will play in the outfield or at first.

Rignor, of the Southern Pacific did a nice job umpiring.

Bert Arnold, who has his arm in condition pitched the last four innings Sunday. Bert had all the steam in the world. He thought nothing of whiffing two in a row when he got in a tight place. With a little more head work Arnold will be in a position to take off his hat to no pitcher in the league.
