SID TERRIS GETS DECISION FROM DUNDEE AS OLD MADISON SQUARE GARDEN PASSES INTO HISTORY

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN
NEW YORK, May 5.—Madison Square Garden, where Sullivan fought and Thaw killed White and Bill Brennan almost sliced the left ear from Jack Dempsey went out of business at last tonight, after many premature farewells when Joe Humphrey, the ancient orator, threw back his head, opened his brassy neck and pitched the crowd in a riot by announcing Sidney Terris of the Eastside had won a 12-round battle from Johnny Dundee by the judges' decision.

It wasn't much of a fuss that the mob kicked up, merely a sentimental squawk for Johnny Dundee, who is as much a landmark in New York as the garden itself. Terris had won most of the way, but the people who had seen Dundee fighting in the ring when Terris was playing with spelling books didn't want it that way.

Dundee started out leading Ter-

ris' speed with more speed, but he couldn't hold the pace beyond the first half of the first round and forced Terris to come to him most of the time after that. Johnny did manage to trot out all the rope-walking antics and leaping tricks which made him famous in his youth as the boy with the rubber ankles. But the vitality wasn't there any more and between these spurts Johnny slowed down and stood spread legged with his thick forearms raised to protect his face. In the second round and in the seventh and again the ninth Terris hurt Dundee badly with a right smash on the head, but the generalship and the amazing skill at head rolling and ducking which has always characterized Dundee's work, saved him each time, as Terris tried to follow him up.

Terris was jarred a few times by Dundee's short left swings to the head, but he never was seriously hurt and played the cautious game of standing at a distance and outboxing Dundee for points.

YANKS STAGE A COMEBACK AFTER LOSING STREAK

After losing five games in a row, and eight out of nine in a slump that may eventually cost them the pennant, the Yankees finally caught the Athletics in a moment of weakness Tuesday and whaled them 8 to 4. It was only their fifth victory in 16 starts since the season opened and it was mostly due to a faulty selection of pitchers by Connie Mack, the enemy commander.

Mack picked Lefty Grooves, his \$100,000 disappointment, to face the Yanks for the second time in two days, and Grooves, who is one of the wildest pitchers in the league, was knocked out of the box.

Notwithstanding their accident, the Athletics retained a one-third interest in first place, for the Indians and Senators, with whom they were tied for the high spot, both were beaten. The Indians dropped a game to the White Sox in Cleveland, 7 to 2, and the Senators were trounced by the Red Sox, 3 to 1. The Tigers won from the Browns, 14 to 8.

Miller Huggins, manager of the Yanks, has been threatening to drop Everett Scott, his shortstop, out of the lineup for a rest after 139 consecutive games, but he keeps Scott in nevertheless.

Huggins says the Yanks are not as bad as the score would make them appear. He explains that his team had the bad luck to play its worst while the Athletics and Senators were playing their best.

The Giants were shipped by the Phils, 13 to 1 in Philadelphia, and the Dodgers will handle the Braves in Boston Friday. This was "Dumey" first win in four starts.

Weightlifter and Williams at the Phils each made two homers, and Scott and Keady of the Giants made one each in a game of heavy hitting.

PROHS PREPARE TO WOR ON RUM FLEETS

CLIFTON, STATEN ISLAND, May 5.—The greatest drive ever launched against rum runners off the Atlantic coast under way at sunset today when a fleet of five cutters, 12 patrol boats and several smaller vessels weighed anchor and proceeded to rum row, approximately 20 miles off the Jersey shore. Three more cutters and 25 patrol boats comprise the dry navy reserve and if the job is too big for the first contingent the reserve will be sent into the battle to make New York drink, if not dry. These cutters are formidable vessels. Seventy coast guardmen man each one of them and their armaments consist of two, six-inch guns, two anti-aircraft guns, four one-pounder and machine guns. The patrol boats carry eight men and do battle with a single one pounder and machine gun.

GOOSE GOSLIN IS REPLACING RUTH IN POPULARITY

NEW YORK, May 5.—"Come on Goose" is getting to be cry around American league circuit almost as familiar as the old cry—"Hit one Babe!"

Leon Goslin, left fielder for the world's champion Washington Senators, known among his teammates and to fans in general as "the Goose," easily was the sensation of the early season in the American league and he seems on the way to become the biggest star in the game. "Everything that fellow does is right. He can't seem to go wrong."

An official of the New York Yankees said during one of the early games of the season when the Goose blew a game right out from under the New York club.

Goslin hits the ball harder than any player in baseball with the exception of the Babe. Give him time and he may be able to get as much distance as the Babe in his drive.

Certainly there is no player in the game today who has as many Ruth-like resemblances in his game as the Goose.

He stands at the plate just like Ruth. He takes the same toe-hold and swings with all his power like the Babe. He has a splendid eye and coordination almost as perfect as the home-run king's.

It may be taken as treason to compare any hitter in the game today to one and only Babe, but the Goose is catching the eye of critics who know that the Babe is speeding to the end of his career and that some one will step up to take his place in the public's heart.

The Goose is 26 years of age. He weighs 180 pounds and has a pair of shoulders that would bring joy to the heart of a football coach. He is almost as perfectly set up as a tennis player, so to speak. Trotzky Coming Back Into Power In Soviet Russia Say Reports

LONDON, May 5.—Leon Trotsky is coming back to power in Soviet Russia, according to the Daily Telegraph which says telegrams from several independent Russian sources forecast the immediate return of the former communist war chief. His return forebodes great change, not only in the personnel and principles of the Soviet government, the Telegraph says.

From Copenhagen it is reported that the council of people's commissaries in session at Moscow deferred a resolution granting Trotsky permission to return to Moscow owing to the opposition of influential communists. Among those were Michael Frunze, who succeeded Trotsky out of the minister of war and Gregory Zinoviev, head of the third international. These men threatened to withdraw from the communist party if Trotsky were permitted to return.
