WORK STARTS AT ONCE ON CENTRAL SCHOOL BUILDING

An adjourned meeting of the directors of the school district met at the Central school yesterday morning at 10:00 o'clock to consult with John Almeter and son who were the lowest bidders for the general contract for erecting a new school for the district. Messrs. Almeter submitted figures to the board showing a saving of \$5,440 if the play sheds attached to the plans as now drawn could be omitted. Inasmuch as the bond issue made some months ago is insufficient to permit the plans be carried out in full, it was decided at this time to eliminate the play sheds and to hold another election as soon as possible for the purpose of erecting these sheds. The board feels the necessity of some play shelter for the children in this project as this building provides no basement at all and it is felt that the voters of the district will authorize a bond issue to provide an enclosed play space for the children during inclement weather. John Almeter, the

successful bidder is the father of Jack Almeter, formerly of this city and now of Chicago. He is a Portland man and is connected with another son on this projected construction. Both of these gentlemen will move to Klamath Falls and make their homes here this summer, giving full attention to the work. The plumbing, heating and electric work will be under separate contracts and the board has not as yet fully decided on the awarding of these contracts. Work on the building will start immediately.

Grants Pass Boy Is Drowned After Hard Struggle In Rapids

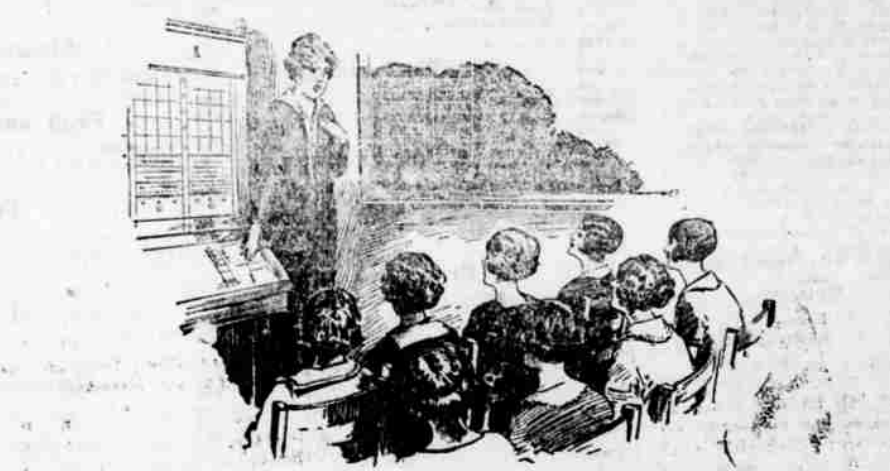
