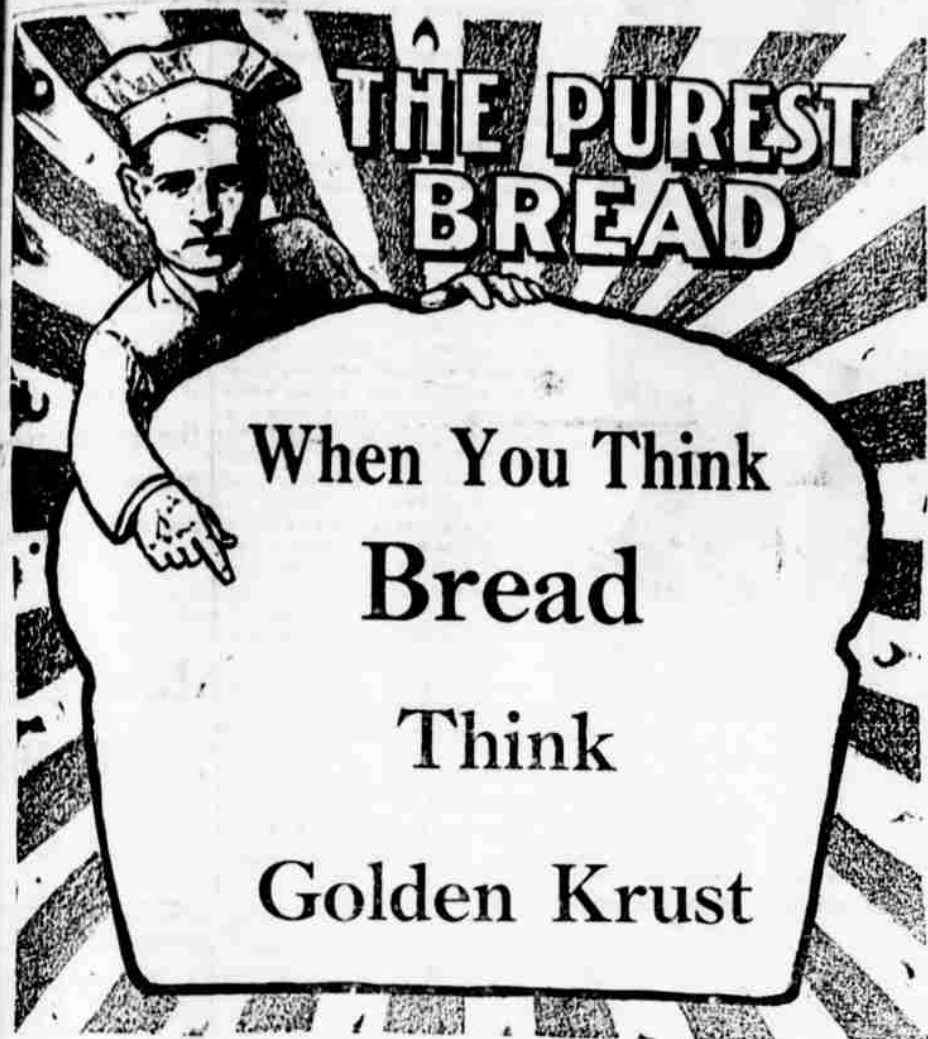


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WAR WILL AND THE WOMEN ING K. P. DUTY

WASHINGTON, May 6.—If there is to be a war, the American woman must be able to shoulder a gun, give first aid to the wounded, and perform other things as kitchen police, messengers, and so on. The war department is now training women in these things as efficiently as possible.

and a member of the general staff. Miss Phipps calls it a "redistribution of capacity." "There are many things that a woman can do better than a man that a man has been called on to do heretofore in war, and women should perform those tasks, so that the men can be freed to fight, and at the same time that particular job will be performed more efficiently," she says.

"Women, for instance, are better cooks than men—they can do the cooking. Women were employed in the last war as laundresses and waitresses, tailors, telephone operators, craftsmen, post exchange workers, technical specialists of various kinds, clerks, salvage workers."

"Women can perform all these jobs efficiently, and many of them more efficiently than men. They tried to use men as telephone operators in the last war, and found that

they were not so quick—and did not have as good manners for this work as women."

Miss Phipps smiled. "Cooking is another place where women would be valuable," she continued. "The average woman knows how to save in her cooking better than a man. During the war, while people throughout the country were doing without this and that kind of food, incompetent cooks in the army were wasting food."

The aim of Miss Phipps' work, ordered by congress for national defense, is to fit the women into places where they can serve to better advantage than men, and thus relieve men for fighting and other duties, which women cannot perform in general, a coordination and co-operation of activity, with the women as a sort of backstop.

NEW FLARE-UP IS THREATENING BALKAN STATES

LONDON, May 6.—Another flare-up is imminent in the Balkans. The approaching trouble may be even more serious than the most recent upheaval during which Jugoslavia all sent troops across the Bulgarian border after Bulgarian politicians and newspapers declared that the plot to murder King Boris and destroy the Bulgarian government with a bomb had been fostered in Belgrade and tacitly approved by Jugo-Slav officials.

By June 1, Bulgaria must demobilize the 10,000 additional militiamen granted her by the council of ambassadors in Paris for the specific purpose of putting down the revolution for which the blast of the Sveti Kral cathedral bomb was the signal. The allies expect Premier Zankoff to do his utmost to avoid demobilization on the pretext that the Bulgarian situation still is so serious that military reinforcement would bare the state to rebel attacks which is could not withstand.

Play For Time
 Zankoff is expected to play for time by any means that presents itself if permission to retain the 10,000 men in service is not granted by the allies.

The first move of course will be a request for an extension of the time limit.

If the demobilization is not complete by June 1 there will be angry reactions in Jugo-Slavia and Greece. These countries already have concentrated large bodies of troops along the Bulgarian frontiers and these will be reinforced to the limit of Greek and Jugo-Slav ability if the 10,000 Bulgarians remain under arms beyond the agreed upon date.

There would be quite as much disagreeable feeling in Athens and Belgrade if the ambassadors should grant Bulgaria an extension of the demobilization time limit. Bulgaria is suspected in every Balkan capital and an addition to her army might strike sparks in every corner of the tinder box.

Allies Negotiating
 Roumania is sympathetic, as the Russian menace on her eastern frontier makes Zankoff's plea, that a communist outbreak in Bulgaria is inevitable unless the 10,000 militia men remain under arms, seem more plausible in Bucharest than in the other Balkan capitals.

The allies are endeavoring to persuade Jugo-Slavia and Greece to permit the allies to handle the demobilization negotiations, as it is feared that, otherwise some incident, perhaps a trivial one, might cause the troops massed along the Bulgarian frontiers to invade the country.
