FAMOUS MOROCCO BRIGAND KILLED

LONDON, May 6.—The London Times correspondent at Tangiers is informed by members of the family of Raisuli the famous Moroccan brigand, that Raisuli died recently at Adjir. The date of the brigand chief's death is unknown according to the dispatch, but it apparently occurred about a fortnight ago.

Raisuli, so-called sultan of the mountains, has been reported dead many times before.

He achieved his greatest notoriety through Theodore Roosevelt's famous ultimatum: "Ferdinand alive or Raisuli dead" sent when Raisuli kidnapped an American merchant and held him for ransom of \$70,000. The captive was released. For a long time, Raisuli held the Spaniards in check in Morocco, but more than two years ago he acknowledged their rule. Recently he was reported a captive of Abd El Krim leader of the Riff tribesmen.

SPRAGUE RIVER FOLK LOOK FOR GOOD YEAR

B. E. Wolford, merchant from Sprague river, braved the rough roads across the reservation to make a trip into the county seat yesterday. Mr. Wolford reports the citizens of the Sprague river country still smiling and cheerful in spite of their isolated condition, due to almost impassable roads during the winter months, and most uncomfortable roads to travel during the rest of the year. He reports that section of Klamath county as looking forward to a profitable year, owing to the rich agricultural lands surrounding it, the active operation of the Campbell-Towle Lumber company, with a monthly payroll of around \$9,000, and the generally prosperous condition of the residents.

Five corporations directed by Charles M. Schwab, multi-millionaire New Yorker, including the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, have been sued by the United States for approximately \$11,500,000, alleged overcharges on war contracts awarded while Schwab was with the U. Los Angeles Mayoralty Vote Shows Close Race

LOS ANGELES, May 6.—Although semi-official returns show Mayor George E. Cryer was re-elected at Tuesday's municipal primary by a 7,000 majority, managers for former Federal Judge Benjamin Bledsoe intimate they may seek a recount of the votes cast.

Judge Bledsoe and Miles Gregory were Cryer's chief opponents. Bledsoe according to late returns, was approximately 15,000 votes behind Cryer.

RESOLUTION Improvement Unit No. 40.

The City Engineer, pursuant to resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 4th day of May, 1925, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving Huron street from Pacific Terrace to El Dorado avenue and El Dorado avenue from Esplanade to Huron street, including intersection with Huron street, and the council having taken same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates to be satisfactory:

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of the said portions of said streets be and the same are hereby approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the common council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvement shall consist of paving said portions of said streets with concrete pavement, warrentite bitulithic pavement with rock base, warrentite bitulithic pavement with bituminous concrete base, asphaltic concrete pavement with rock base, or asphaltic concrete pavement with concrete base, at an estimated cost, including cement sidewalks, curbing, gutters and drainage for concrete pavement, warrentite bitulithic pavement with rock base, or asphaltic concrete pavement with concrete base, of \$11,255.75, and for warrentite bitulithic pavement with bituminous concrete base, asphaltic concrete with asphaltic concrete base, of \$11,684.75.
