Accused by Husband in Scandal

Lieutenant-Colonel Ian G. Dennistoun, testifying in the suit of Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun, his former wife, in the London Courts, charged that on coming home one night he found his bed had been occupied by a woman, whom he said she had been (most) seen in the house in America, whom she first said she befriended when he lost the key to his apartment, but later, according to Dennistoun, admitted to having been in the house. Mrs. Dennistoun, who is seeking to regain funds amounting to \$10,000 she alleges, she advanced to Dennistoun, now the husband of Lieutenant-Lady Dennistoun, charged he had "lost" her to General Sir John Towns, British Lieutenant-General during the war, in order that he might personally benefit by promotion in military and diplomatic circles.

HAWAIIANS MUST BE MILITARIZED OFFICERS CONCUR

HONOLULU, May 6.—The necessity of increasing defenses of the island of Oahu has been admitted by the 300 army, navy and marine officers who reviewed results of the theoretical attack upon Hawaii by the United States fleet.

Chief umpires of the maneuvers, Major General J. L. Hines, and Admiral Robert E. Coontz, issued a brief statement today at the close of the five-day critique which followed the war game.

Aside from stressing the importance of making Oahu's resisting power the strongest possible, the statement was extremely laconic. It declared that problems worked out between the date of the fleet's departure from San Francisco, April 15, and the close of the sham battle of Oahu on April 27, disclosed certain deficiencies not only of the island defenses, but with the fleet as well.

The umpires praised the work of both the "blue" forces, playing the part of an attacking power, and the "black" defenders. They gave no decision, however, as to which side would be declared the winner in the mock warfare.
