Boy Scouts May Have New Cabin At Bear Wallow

If the plans of Jack Kimball and the local boosters for the Boy Scouts materialize, the boys will have a log cabin summer camp headquarters at the Bear Wallow on the west side highway around Upper Klamath lake. The Bear Wallow is located 11 1/2 miles from Klamath Falls and is surrounded by one of the most beautiful pine forests in this section.

Kimball, who is a director of the Crater Lake Boy Scout council, stated yesterday that he would recommend to the Weyerhaeuser Timber company which owns the forests in the Bear Wallow locality, that a considerable acreage be turned over to the boys for a summer playground. This decision was reached following a visit to the proposed site yesterday by Kimball, C. S. Chapman, head forester for Weyerhaeuser, Roy Arthur L. Rice and Cecil A. Cook, scout executive who has recently been installed in this district.

Boys To Help

"If this goes through as we have planned the boys will be fixed in fine shape," Kimball pointed out. "Our plans are to assist the boys to build a first class log cabin near the little mountain lake. It would be built in this way: We would ask loggers around the lake to donate a Sunday or two to felling the trees, cutting up the logs, and hewing them out properly. The walls and pole rafters would then be put up by the volunteers. At this point we would call off all adult help and turn the job over to the boys to finish and you can bet they will finish it right. Their work would be to chink the cracks between the logs with mud and moss, put in the shakes on the roof, put in the doors and windows, and furnish the interior in first class shape with furniture made on the ground of their own handiwork. After the cabin was completed they would of course want to turn their attention to building trails to different places of interest that are adjacent to the lake. They would have a good trail down to the swimmin' hole no doubt.

"It's all rather indefinite yet of course but it looks practical and it looks possible and there is no one who will dispute that such an arrangement would be a great thing for these kids."

FARMERS FROM OWENS VALLEY LIKE KLAMATH

Influence of Six Visitors Here Expected To Bring In 150 New Families

The delegation of Owens valley farmers, who accompanied Sam Head here this week, spent yesterday looking over Langell Valley, and the Merrill country, and they are leaving for home this morning with a warm spot in their heart for all the Klamath country, according to their statements last night.

"We figured there must be something wrong with this country if good land could be bought for the prices that we understood were being asked for Klamath land," one of them pointed out. "We came to see for ourselves and you can say for me we are convinced that you have as good land here as can be found in any country." We are going back and deliver a mighty favorable report to all our neighbors. We are accustomed to such climatic conditions as you have here, since our valley which won world-wide notoriety last summer over a little water fight we had with the city of Los Angeles, is only thirty feet lower in elevation than Klamath Falls."

Same Conditions

The party of Owens Valley visitors is made up of George Rowe, Alvin Bodie, L. W. Monroe, A. S. Donham, C. N. Rose and T. M. Shumate. Speaking of the conditions in Owens Valley at the present time, which are responsible for these settlers looking for a new location, it was pointed out that over 200 families had already sold their land in the valley to the city of Los Angeles on account of the desperate need for their water by the city. A great many of these have left and are probably located in some other locality at the present time. There are still around 150 families in the valley and for the city to get satisfactory control of the water, they must buy every one of these settlers out.

The city of Los Angeles doesn't stand very high with the Owens valley people. It was most evident from their remarks last night. They feel that the southern California metropolis isn't disposed to pay them one cent more than they are forced to pay. About four and one-half million dollars has recently been voted by the city for the purpose of turning the Owens valley farms back into a desert. It is a big valley, however, over ten miles wide and nearly one hundred miles long, but contains a great area of waste land which of course, does not enter into the controversy.

Indians On Trail Of San Quentin Murderers

(By United News Lased Wire) SACRAMENTO, May 7.—Indian trackers, sent out from Colfax, have picked up the trail of Joe Tanko and Lloyd Hall, convicted killers who escaped from San Quentin. Bernard McShane, Sacramento chief of police who is directing the man-hunt for the two desperadoes, telephone his office this evening that Frank Slouthead, veteran Indian hunter and guide, had sighted the fugitives on Bear river, six miles north of Cape Horn. Slouthead fired one shot before they slipped into the brush, McShane said.

THIEVES HEADED FOR THIS CITY IN STOLEN CAR

Gang Speed Through Ashland Fire At Officer And Make Getaway

Passing through Ashland at break-neck speed, firing at an officer who attempted to intercept them, a party of automobile thieves were heading in the direction of this city on the Klamath Falls-Ashland highway early this morning, according to telephone advices received at the local police station. The highway here was being guarded early this morning.

The entire police and sheriff's forces at Ashland were reported following in the wake of the escaped thieves, searching each side road for the men.

The Ashland police were on the lookout for the party when officials at Grants Pass reported a Star touring car, stolen from that city, headed southward on the highway. Traffic Officer Talent, of Ashland, who identified the car, attempted to overtake them. Gaining on them, the thieves fired several shots at the officer from the rear of the car, making their getaway.

Up until early this morning the car had not entered Klamath Falls, according to Deputy Snyder.

LAWLESSNESS IS CURBED BY NIGHT WHOLESALE RAIDS

Seven men and women were arrested, two cars confiscated, and one car was reported stolen last night in a serious of lawbreaking partially broken up by city police and sheriff's deputies.

J. C. Paul, a man named Shuback and a driver of a White Star taxi were arrested in company with Pearl Wilson and Maria Bean as they drove up in front of Edna McDonald's place. A number of towels and 32 ounces of moonshine were confiscated with the taxi.

A raid on the home of Jim Flannery and 802 Oak streets was raided by Chief Loucks, Officers Lewis, Brown and Cooper and Deputy Sheriff Snyder. Officers allege they caught Flannery in the act of dumping out a bucket of moon, obtaining part of the evidence.

E. Pendleton was arrested, charged with having liquor in his car, which was confiscated. Patrolmen Lewis and Cooper made the arrests. All above persons were held in jail for hearing today. It was indicated some of the cases would be tried in federal court.

A Ford roadster, owned by J. E. Patterson, Jr., was stolen from in front of The News office. The car bore an Oregon license number 187-749, was equipped with Kelly Springfield tires, motor meter and oversized steering wheel.

Petitions Is Filed By Hill Lines For Entry To Klamath

Kirkford, Chiloquin, Klamath Agency, Olene and Bonanza Included in Routing; No New Securities To Be Issued; Both S. P. and O. C. E. To Be Paralleled.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Application of the Oregon Trunk railway for extensions south from Bend to Klamath Falls was formally filed with interstate commerce commission today. The petition asks approval of construction of approximately 250 miles of railroad under the joint and equal patronage of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern and does not at this time seek the issue of any new securities, as the funds required will be supplied by the northern lines. If financing is required later on, it was said, separate applications will be made.

The principal stations designated as those the new railroad will pass through or near are: Bend, Lapine, Crescent, Skookum, Kirkford, Chiloquin, Klamath Agency, Bonanza, Olene and Klamath Falls. The longer and so-called Malin line will go down the Sycan and the Sprague rivers and will be about 180 miles long.

The shorter extension in a more direct line of 80 miles from the vicinity of Skookum, down the west side of Upper Klamath lake, touches Kirkford, Chiloquin and Klamath Agency, practically paralleling the Southern Pacific.

The commission is asked to grant a hearing on the application and request is made for the retention of any earnings in excess of the standard rate of return. It is stated that there is a body of 40,000,000,000 board feet of timber mostly pine, along the routes of the proposed lines which will have a wide market from the northern lines and their connection and that the condition justify the present construction of the road. By blue prints filed with the applications it appears that the new construction will substantially parallel the line of the O. C. & E. railway for some distance north of Sprague River. The shorter extension from the junction point crosses the Upper Klamath lake from the mouth of Williamson river to a point opposite on the western shore.

Hindenburg Departs Home Town Amidst Elaborate Farewell

(By United News Lased Wire) HANOVER, May 7.—Twenty-thousand men, women and children paraded by President-elect von Hindenburg's home tonight in a farewell demonstration to Hanover's most famous citizen.

The old soldier took the salute in a balcony where he stood wearing a combre frock coat and a high silk hat. As the marchers approached the home the strains of two bands playing in unison compelled them to adopt the martial goose step cadence which has roared and rumbled beneath caulked boots of millions of soldiers, who paraded past the old marshal in other days.

Leaping flames from thousands of torches illuminated the parade and cast fleeting light and shadows over the form and features of the old warrior. As flags bobbed by in the hands of goose-stepping bearers, Hindenburg removed his hat.
