INDIANS RAMBLE INTO TRIPLE TIE FOR FIRST PLACE

Although the migrations in both major leagues did not make for a maximum of contests along the circuits Thursday, a maximum number of disturbances in the tell-tale percentage columns occurred.

With the Senators and Athletics quiet in the American league, the Indians took advantage of their opportunity and crashed into a triple tie for top position by winning over Chicago, 7 to 5. The Cleveland team punched four runs in the third and added three more in the fifth, a lead that the White Sox failed to overcome.

Ty Cobb failed in his attempt to set a mark in the field of successive home runs and Detroit lost to the Browns, 6 to 5, a result which pushed them down to bottom place in the league standing, saving the Yankees temporarily from the disgrace, by boosting them into a tie for seventh place with Boston.

The Yanks and Red Sox were not in uniform.

In the National league the Dodgers and Pittsburgh, strong contenders last season, remained true to their 1925 form, and took another plunge toward the bottom of the percentage column. By scoring six runs in the eighth inning, the Cardinals defeated the Pirates, 10 to 5, giving the latter a season's record of six won and eleven lost, the worst record in the league.

Although Cooney was ineffective on the mound, the Braves won over the Dodgers 7 to 3, and advanced to the position just above that assumed by Pittsburgh.

The Giants beat the Phillies, 11 to 5.

Stribling Gets a Technical Knockout Over Romero Rojas

BOSTON, May 7.—With a superior display of ring generalship, Young Stribling of Georgia, won a technical knockout today over Quintin Romero Rojas, the Chilean, in three and one-half rounds of a scheduled 10-round bout.

Stribling was master of the situation from the opening of the first round.

He knocked Romero down twice for a brief count in the third, following a staggering series of left and right smashes to the head.

Going into the fourth round, Stribling leaped out to finish off his man, and floored him once again in the Chilean's own corner.

It was then apparent that Rojas was completely outclassed, and Referee Brassell waved the Chilean to his corner after one minute and 25 seconds of the fourth frame.

Stribling, fighting his second heavyweight bout, weighed in at 179. Rojas weighed 192.

Stribling recently defeated Joe Burke, Detroit heavyweight. This fight tonight was his 44th knockout and 138th fight.

PALO ALTO, Calif., May 7.—Ernest Nevers, Stanford university football captain and all-around athletic star, today was awarded the \$255 alumni scholarship, given annually to the athlete who makes the best scholastic record over a two-year period.

F. R. Muhs, Cardinal high jumper, was awarded the skull and snake cup as the junior athlete who made the best scholastic standing.

NEW YORK, May 7.—Special police protection will be provided for the stables day and night during the race meetings this summer at the Empire City track, according to James E. Butler, president of the track.

I also want to go after the lightweight championship, and if Sammy Mandell wins the elimination tournament that is now being promoted I will be the first to challenge him."

Million Chinese Reported Starving

LONDON, May 7.—Millions of Chinese are starving in the province of Kwei Chow in the southwest part of China, according to a dispatch to the Daily Express. Cannibalism is said to have become common in the villages as the plagued natives struggle to live.

The famine area embraces sixty districts, and throughout the territory Chinese are dying by the hun-

drade from lack of food. The roads are littered with dead, while hungry families creep forward toward the towns, where many of them die on the doorsteps as they beg for food, which is not to be had. The hoard from last year's harvest was exhausted long ago, and the people have stripped the leaves from the trees, and now are living on grass or human flesh.

Portions of the countryside have been depopulated by the migration of the natives in search of food. The situation is likely to become worse, as large scale relief is impossible until the rice crop is harvested, despite the efforts of missionaries who are doing their utmost to feed the hungry mouths. The provincial treasury is empty, and without adequate funds, but slight progress can be made against the pressure of such wholesale disaster.

The first time Willie Stribling's name was heard above a whisper was the time he enticed Mickey McTigue to Macon, Ga., which was no health resort for a tourist by any such name as Mickey McTigue, and gave him a ten-round whaling.

Willie was a high school boy at the time and a family boy, too. His parents were retired vaudeville athletes and they knew enough about the show business to see the ballyhoo value of a family troupe. Willie was snatched out of school and routed over as hard a tour of the fight cities as ever a fighter traveled. His father worked on him in his corners and his mother always had a chair at the ringside. It was very colorful showmanship, and the Stribling family made a fortune.

On their tour, the Striblings chanced into Buffalo, N. Y., where they were offered a piece of work, as the term goes in the fight business, with a new kid, a sort of novice, named Jimmy Slattery.

Up to this time the name of Jimmy Slattery hadn't been heard above a whisper, but when he clouted Willie Stribling for two flops in six rounds and won the decision, his name became a roar.

Willie was fought white before he cut off his gloves and settled down for the winter to rebuild himself.

He may never amount to much now.

Slattery won't be 21 until August, but he has stopped Frankie Schoell and Augie Ratner among a lot of other tough seasoned fighters, and has twice whipped Jack Delaney, who stopped Paul Berlinbach once and Tiger Flowers twice.

Slattery has been eased along. He has only started his career, although he has fought Harry Greb and held the champion to a close decision over the sprint course of six rounds, which enabled Greb to leap and prance at his highest speed.

Aside from the fact that a dozen experts have picked him a future Dempsey, which is always a handicap, the Slattery kid's future gleams with a bright golden polish.

Thousands Pouring Into Baltimore For Big Pimlico Races

PIMLICO RACE TRACK, Md., May 7.—The combined Green Tree stable and H. P. Whitney entries apparently have caught the fancy of the thousands of followers of the turf who are pouring into Maryland for the \$50,000 preakness, the first rich classic of the season, which will be run here Friday.

Backbone, the Green Tree colt, and Chantley, of the Whitney farm, probably will command 2 to 1 odds in the pari-mutuel wagering on the 14 colts, and one filly which will line up at the post in the fifth at Pimlico.

Singlefoot, the entry of J. E. Griffith, has gathered a considerable following, by negotiating a five-eighth mile workout in 1:00 3/5. Odds on Singlefoot, although he was beaten by Overall at Havre de Grace, are estimated at 4 to 1.

Bud Fisher's Swope will attract a good bit of attention with Earl Sande, premier jockey up.

Friday's classic will be the 18th running of the famous preakness. This year's field is the same size as that of last year.

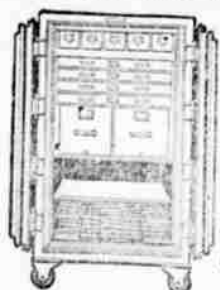

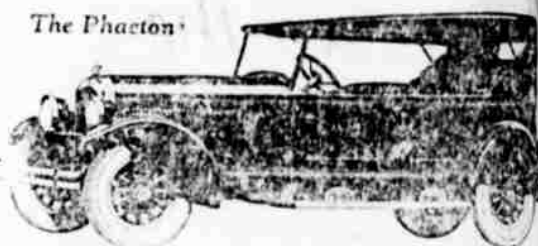
