INVESTIGATION OF HELL SHIP STARTS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—Maritime authorities here have begun an investigation of alleged "hell-ship" practices aboard the barkentine City of Sidney.

Jake Young, 30 year old Chicago negro, was picked out of San Francisco bay today. Near exhaustion, Young said that he had jumped overboard from the City of Sidney rather than endure the "hell ship" conditions there.

Young charged that two women were kept aboard the vessel, and that men shipped for the Alaska coast fishing grounds enticed in continuous orgies on liquor sold them at exorbitant prices.

Although promised \$150 for the trip north, Young said he was taxed \$60 for equipment. Ship's officers had a system of fines whereby every petty offense was assessed heavily, and gambling games were played constantly, he declared.

According to harbor records, the City of Sidney is a clearing ship for the Union Fish company and the property of the Alaska Fishing company. Officials of these concerns denied Young's allegations.
