SYNTHETIC FOOD PROMISES A NEW ERA IN MANKIND

WASHINGTON, May 7.—A new era in the history of mankind, when human beings will subsist entirely on food produced synthetically, is forecast by Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover following a successful experiment by chemists in which sugar was made by passing light rays through formaldehyde.

If sugar can be made synthetically, then starch, and in time, numerous other foods probably can be produced through the same chemical processes, Hoover declared.

He described the sugar producing experiment as the "greatest chemical discovery" of the last 50 years before of the new fields which it opens up and of the possibilities which it holds. Of course this is a chemical problem and not a commercial problem. The next step will be to make it practical, so that quantity production will be possible in this and in other food.

Scientists see the time coming, when through the increase of population, it will be necessary for man to get at least a part of his food through such laboratory production. They are seeking to learn how the sources of energy can be utilized to produce this food.

Will Revolutionize

Essentially, it is a problem of doing in the laboratory what the plants do for themselves in producing foods upon which man lives. Plants convert the waste products of animal life into foods for themselves, a process called photosynthesis. The plant absorbs through its leaves the carbon dioxide which is present everywhere in the atmosphere, and which is formed by burning of coal fuel and other such energy producers. Thus, the problem is for man to do the same thing by chemical processes.

Laboratory production of course, is costly. As yet it has not been possible to produce foods commercially, because the green leaf is cheaper than laboratory apparatus, and sunlight is cheaper than the ultra-violet ray, as one scientist expressed it.

A Distinct Advance

Chemists have been working for years on this problem. Already, over 200,000 synthetic products, compounds of carbon mostly with hydrogen and oxygen, have been made, among them some foods. These are compounds that do not exist in nature.

This production of sugar in the laboratory, however, is a distinct advance, and forecasts a time when commercial production of this and other basic foods can be produced in the laboratory. A French scientist has made a prophecy, which has come nearer realization:

"The day will come," he said, "when each person will carry for his nourishment his little nitrogenous tablet, his pot of fatty matter, his package of starch of sugar, his vial of aromatic spices suited to his personal taste."

"There will no longer be hills covered with vineyards, and fields filled with cattle."

RED CROSS TO TEACH FIREMEN HERE FIRST AID

A plan was launched here yesterday by Miss Nell Holsinger, field representative of the American Red Cross, to organize the Klamath Falls firemen, both regulars and volunteers into a class for a course of ten lessons in "First Aid." The lectures to be given by one of the local physicians.
