CONNIE MACK'S BOYS JUMP INTO AMERICAN LEAD

The United States baseball team, led by Connie Mack's Athletics, took first position in the American league standing Friday when he held the outstanding Indians to seven scattered hits in the ball park at Cleveland, as Philadelphia won a 5 to 1 victory.

The game for first place which preceded last Thursday's results was dominated by the defeat of Washington in Chicago, by the narrow margin of 4 to 3.

After seven of the series, the Athletics now stand in the lead with a record of 11 wins and 10 losses. The Athletics had Indians one tied for second place, with 12 victories and 8 defeats.

The Yankees took their lives in their hands before a St. Louis crowd by defeating the Braves in a loose 12 to 5. The slugging was credited to "Urban" Shocker, who went the limit for the crippled New Yorkers to five mealy hits.

Boston pushed the Tigers further into the sub-basement of the league by beating them 15 to 7, with Ike Boone driving in five runs.

The Braves celebrated the golden anniversary of the founding of the National League by defeating the Chicago Cubs 5 to 2, before a distinguished baseball crowd, including many of the veterans of the early days of the diamond. The victory raised the Braves' position above that of the Cardinals, who are now just above the Pirates in the bottom position.

The Giants maintained their consistent superiority by winning over the Cardinals 5 to 2 at the Polo Grounds. Brooklyn beat the Cincinnati Reds 3 to 2, while the Phillies and Pirates engaged in heavy hitting until the score keepers tired and awarded the victory to Philadelphia, 15 to 7.

Des Moines Police To Parade Cars Wrecked From Drunken Drivers

DES MOINES, Iowa, May 8.—Drastic innovations in the handling of rum runners and bootleggers who fall into the clutches of Des Moines' police, will be put into operation in the near future in accordance with instructions issued today by James Cavender, police chief of Iowa's capital. The police chief stated that it has become virtually impossible for the police department to secure co-operation in its efforts to have bootleggers and other violators of the prohibition laws convicted in either the municipal or district courts.

Chief Cavender's utterances followed closely on the heels of a motor car accident here, in which two women were injured. The police department head claimed that the feminine driver of the automobile had been imbibing freely from a container filled with alcohol. He explained that he believed the accident would not have happened if she had not been intoxicated.

The machine which was damaged in the accident was adorned with various placards and towed through the city's down town section.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 8—Frank Lux, a Columbus, Ohio, jockey, went flying over the head of a stumbling horse Friday afternoon, and was so trampled that he died in the emergency hospital at the Beulah track a few minutes later. Lux was riding Mary Rock in the first race and fell directly in her path as the horse stalled. As the mare plunged down upon him his skull was fractured and his chest crushed.
