Trotzky Once More Declares for Reds

(By United News Leased Wire) MOSCOW, May 8.—Leon Trotsky has branded as "pure taxation" the resolutions appearing in the press of the continent and Europe that he proposed a broad-based democracy and freedom of trade in commodities.

Trotsky declared his continued faith in the principles of communism and his "firm, unshakable" loyalty to the Soviet government. He said that he was the only one of the Bolshevik party who stood for the idea of a united front of all workers and peasants against the bourgeoisie.

"Facing up to the whole picture," Trotsky said in reaffirming his faith in the face of Lenin, "I consider the Soviet system, the dictatorship of the proletariat, and the policy of foreign trade, indispensable conditions of the socialist structure."
