GIBBONS PREDICTS TUNNEY WILL MEET DEFEAT BY A K. O.

NEW YORK, May 11.—Tommy Gibbons, the St. Paul heavyweight, does not believe that Gene Tunney, American light-heavyweight champion, will be able to stand up against him for the full quota of rounds, when the two meet at the Polo Grounds, July 5.

"It is not my habit to settle bouts out of the ring or to make predictions," Gibbons said after arriving Monday, "but I will venture a guess that the fight will not go the limit."

Gibbons said that he was in fighting shape and that he would be able to step into the ring within a week. "All I need is a little boxing to polish me up," he said. "I am weighing about 190 pounds now, but I may be a little fat and it is probable that I will be about 185 or 187 ring side for the fight."

If movie actors have feelings, how do you reckon they feel about the invasion of their trade, or art, as it is sometimes called in a joking way, by champion fighters and ball players?

About the same way, perhaps, that writers feel when literary gold-bricks break into the newspaper as starred feature writers.

It is strange, but true, that the professional athlete, whose skull may be thick and stout as an oak door, is presumed to be a great actor and a great writer, and is almost certain to be starred in both of these arts as soon as he has knocked a few flyballs over a short-field fence or flopped a few tamales in the ring.

There is a widespread notion that movie actors carry the irreducible minimum of freight in the region north of their necks but that can't be true of the whole craft. Some of them undoubtedly are intelligent and work like hod-carriers when they do work, and starve between jobs.

This class of movie people probably derives as little joy from the stardom of the brawlers in the leaping pictures as real reporters derive from their stardom in the newspapers.

When a man or woman has worked 15 or 25 years in the drama of journalism and has played the game hard to succeed, you can't expect any cheers for an interloper who has to be told how to walk into a room without falling on his face or how to write a sentence without using "ain't got no."
