ember 12, the day Gen. Pershing retired as general of the armies, and also the anniversary of the battle of St. Mihiel, the first major offensive of the A. E. F. Gen. Pershing and all other army officers pronounced it a success from every point of view. They felt that it had two principal benefits, first, the technical benefit derived from a test demonstration of the machinery by which the organized reserves are to be mustered into service in event of war, and second, the benefit derived in impressing the public mind with the necessity of civilian support for the army.

Man Can Live on 51 Cents Day; Woman On 41; Not in K. F.

BERKELEY, May 12.—Sufficient food to maintain the average male adult in health can be obtained at a daily cost of 51.2 cents. A woman can live on 41.14 cents a day. These figures were announced Tuesday by the division of nutrition at the University of California and are listed as quotas for persons engaged in moderately active work.

The cost per person per day in a family of five is given as 20.5 cents.

Instead of computing the daily expense of feeding children, the report deals with these items on a monthly basis. The following amounts are listed:

Age 15 years, \$11.786; 11 years, \$8.567; 7 years, \$7.412; 4 years, \$7.067; 2 years, \$6.367, and one year, \$5.013.

PORTLAND, May 12.—That the constitutionality of the Oregon compulsory bill will be decided upon the arguments already submitted to the United States supreme court became apparent Monday, when Supreme Justice Taft overruled a will be present to congress at its motion of a Michigan organization next session.

which asked that the Michigan people be allowed to enter the case. This would have thrown the whole matter open again.

Word of the decision of Justice Taft was received by Joseph A. Hill, head of the Hill military academy, which is one of the plaintiffs bringing the suit to overthrow the law.

The law was held unconstitutional by the federal court in Portland, and the state appealed to the supreme court.

A decision is expected shortly, as the arguments were completed last month. The Michigan people were interested because of steps toward a similar law being taken in that state.
