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CUBS NIGGERED

OUT OF DOUBLE BILL YESTERDAY

The Chicago Cubs took a long slide down the percentage column in Boston Tuesday, when the Braves, under the leadership of Johnny Cooney and Rube Marquard won their fourth and fifth consecutive victory. Cooney, on the mound in the first game of the double bill, blanked the club, allowing only six hits. Marquard, who was credited with the second game, gave one run in the third. The two defeats sent the Chicago team, which had been tied for second place in the league standing down through the list to sixth place, with a percentage record just two points worse than the Phillies. The score was 2 to 0 and 3 to 1.

The long drop of the Cubs, coupled with a heavy schedule among the other team played havoc with the standings. New York, with a victory over the Cardinals 3 to 1 at the Polo Grounds naturally remained in the lead. Cincinnati, winning over Brooklyn, 2 to 1 hung onto second place. Otherwise it was a day of rises and falls. The Braves became shapers of third position with the Dodgers, coming up from sixth place. Philadelphia broke even with Pittsburgh in a double header and remained in fifth place, while the Pirates climbed over the Cardinals into the seventh berth.

In the American league the outstanding event of the day was a defeat of the Senators in the first game of a series with the Browns at St. Louis, 6 to 3. Dixie Davis held the champions to eight scattered hits while the Browns bunched three runs off Zachary in the fourth inning. With the defeat of Washington and their victory in Detroit over the Tigers, 4 to 3, the Athletics were enabled to increase their margin of leadership in the league standing. Cleveland pushed the Senators hard for second place by winning over Boston, 9 to 4. Urban Shocker's wildness and Falk's hitting cost the Yanks their opening game in Chicago, 5 to 4.

NOTICE INVITING BIDS FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

Unit No. 37. Pursuant to ordinance of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said city, at his office in the City Hall, 25 to and including Monday, May 25th, 1925, at 8:00 o'clock P. M. for making the proposed improvement of Second Street from Pine Street northerly to Jefferson Street, including intersection at Jefferson Street.

The proposed improvement to be made includes the grading of said street to the established grade, to a width of twenty-four (24) feet, except at intersections, where said pavement is to be full width of intersection, with concrete sidewalks 5 feet wide on both sides of said improvement throughout its entire distance, the same to be in all respects according to the plans of the City Engineer on file with the Police Judge.

Said improvement shall be made of concrete pavement, reinforced concrete pavement, Warrentite Bitulithic pavement, Warrentite Bitulithic pavement with bituminous concrete base, asphaltic concrete pavement with rock base, or same with asphaltic concrete base, all of said proposed improvements to be made together with the materials to be used, in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference to which is hereby made regarding further details for plans, construction, materials, quantities, and the like.

Said improvement will be let in one contract and bids will be received for each kind of pavement specified above, and will be opened for consideration by the Common Council on the said 25th day of May, 1925, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the City Engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted. Bids for bids may be obtained at the office of the Police Judge.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a check certified by some responsible bank for 5 per cent of the amount bid, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city for the making of such improvement within 10 days from the date of making such award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to make such improvement on behalf of the city.

RESOLUTION Improvement Unit No. 40.

The City Engineer, pursuant to resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 4th day of May, 1925, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving Huron street from Pacific Terrace to El Dorado avenue and El Dorado avenue from Esplanade to Huron street, including intersection with Huron street, and the council having taken same under advisement and finding said

plans, specifications and estimates to be satisfactory.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of the said portions of said streets be and the same are hereby approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the common council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvement shall consist of paving said portions of said streets with concrete pavement, warrentite bitulithic pavement with rock base, warrentite bitulithic pavement with bituminous concrete base, asphaltic concrete pavement with rock base, or asphaltic concrete pavement with asphaltic concrete base, at an estimated cost, including cement sidewalks, curbing, gutters and drainage, for concrete pavement, warrentite bitulithic pavement with rock base, or asphaltic concrete pavement with rock base, of \$11,684.75. Said improvement in either event to include grading, rolling and curbing, and drainage; said pavement to be twenty-five (25) feet wide, with concrete sidewalks five (5) feet wide on both sides thereof, with parking strips leveled throughout on both sides; and
