

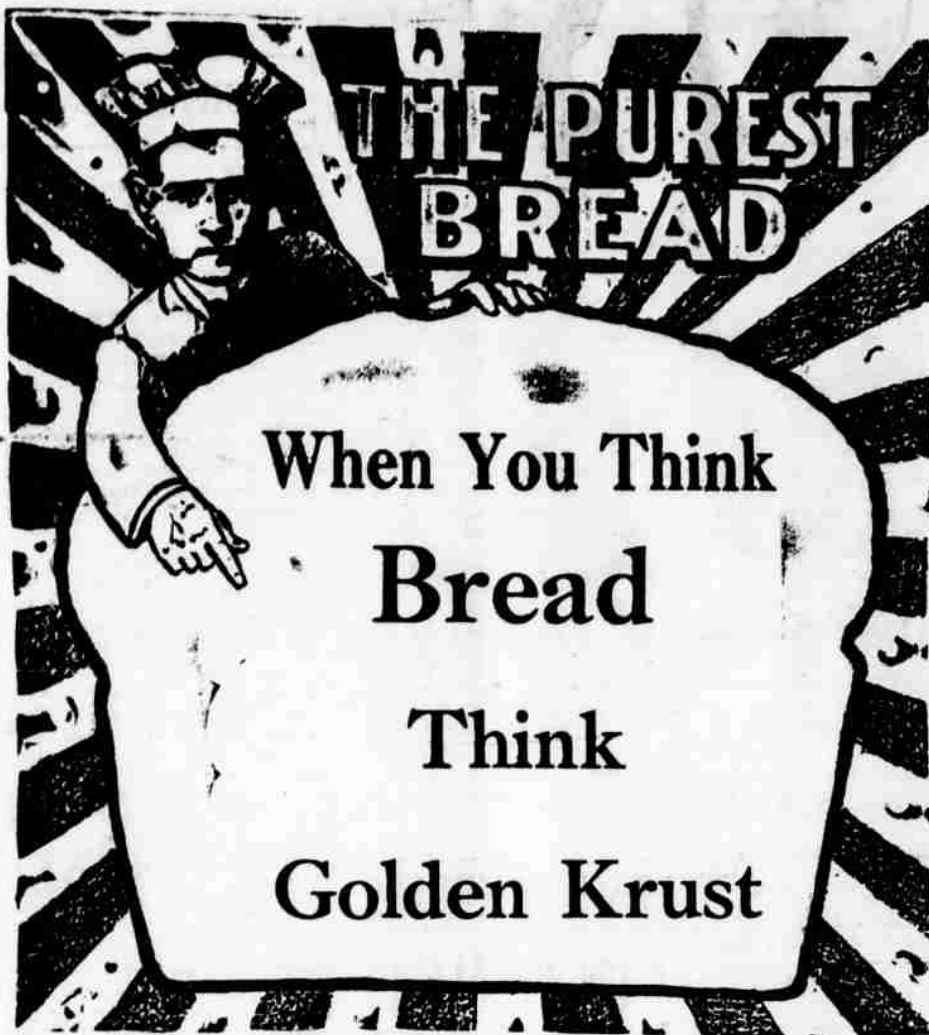

When they are struck by the trag- edy of his fall, Griff can't get the idea at all. He knows he would always be able to panhandle enough to buy his meals and drinks and his bed. What more does a fellow want anyway?

One night Griff happened into a rather shabby drinking place, sat down, ordered a steak, surrounded the same, and remarked to the bootlegger in charge:

"I say, y' know, I 'avent a copper to me n'yme to pay for this here."

"Oh that's all right, Griff," said the proprietor, "I'll pay you the price of the meal," and handed Young Griff \$1.50.

Griff likes to talk about his old fights and his time of prosperity, but not in rueful way. He discussed these things as though it were quite natural that he should become a pan- handler in his old age. Trouble never troubled him and he will be the last one to trouble trouble.

If Griff's thoughts on spenders and spending as he watches the vain, gaudy parade go by at night, could be put into phrases they would probably read something like this: "Ave a good time, boys and gals, and if you do 'ave a good time, it's worth all you pay for it."
