O'Connor advocates the sale of the entire fleet of 1200 vessels, and favors the immediate scrapping of at least 200 ships in the fleet.

The shipping board vessels represent an original investment of one billion dollars, but the government, it is understood, would sell them today at nominal cost.

But as this fleet is costing about \$50,000,000 a year to the government, the board is disposed to shave its prices to hurry up sales. Bargain prices are offered. There is no hope of the government coming out even. What it is trying to do is to get out quickly with the smallest loss.

More important than the matter of price is the willingness of prospective purchasers to maintain the ships on established trade routes. The government wants to build up an effective American flag shipping service. In this respect Ford's ability as a big scale operator, his success in railroading and other activities in addition to his motor car manufacturing recommend him highly to the government. Shipping board officials feel that if Henry Ford took over the fleet, he would make it go.

"We approached Mr. Ford with a proposition for buying outright a number of our ships and operating them," O'Connor said. "Mr. Ford was impressed with the whole idea. He said that whatever was good for America appealed to him. He wants to keep the American flag flying everywhere."

O'Connor believes that American merchant ships can be operated only under private control.

"We went to Detroit," O'Connor said, "feeling we would be well repaid if Mr. Ford granted us a short interview. We were greatly surprised when he laid aside everything and went into all phases of the merchant marine situation. He discussed

PREVENTION OF FOREST FIRES

Klamath Chamber To Aid
Drive June 22 to July
3 This Year

The "stop forest fires" movement, which was originated last year by the Klamath county chamber of commerce, and adopted throughout practically every timbered section of the Pacific coast, will be observed this year from June 22nd to July 3rd, according to the decision of the Stop Fires association directors, who met at the chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon.

Klamath county will again take the lead this year, and an elaborately gotten up letter will be broadcast from the local chamber this coming week to all chambers of commerce, lumbermen, and forestry officials of the coast, suggesting the observance of "Stop Forest Fires week" universally on the same date that has been set here. This particular time has been suggested owing to the fact that most people are believed to invade the timbered areas of the county just preceding the Fourth of July.

At the meeting yesterday it was pointed out that for four weeks following the "Stop Forest Fires week" last summer, not a single instance of a man-set fire was recorded in the Klamath district, notwithstanding it was the most dangerous time from a fire standpoint, of an exceptionally dry year.

MRS. SHEPHERD IS FREED FROM CHARGE

an impassioned address by Judge Harry Olson to the coroner's jury investigating the death trail of the McClintock fortune.

Olson, who pushed the investigation which led to Shepherd's arrest, painted the statuesque wife of the lawyer as a lady McBeth shrewdly urging a weak willed husband to plot the death of all who stood between him and possession of the McClintock millions. Charging that Mrs. Shepherd aided her husband in what Olson says was a plot to poison Billy McClintock, the judge placed special emphasis on circumstances

surrounding the death of the youth's mother in 1909.

When the body of Mrs. McClintock was exhumed recently at Olson's request, it was found that she died from mercurial poisoning. The coroner's chemist, examining the body, stated that it contained "enough mercury to kill two people." Mrs. McClintock had been taken ill while at Bayview, Texas, where the Shepherds had accompanied her to a cottage she owned. Weakened, the wealthy widow returned to her home in Chicago. Mrs. Shepherd came with her and was in the room when Mrs. McClintock died.

Under the terms of her will, Mrs. Shepherd and her husband took charge of Billy, the infant "millionaire orphan" who fell heir to the McClintock fortune of more than \$1,000,000. Olson charged that the mother had been murdered as one link of a conspiracy to obtain possession of the estate, and subsequently Billy met the same fate.

Twenty-one witnesses appeared before the grand jury today to testify on the charges against Mrs. Shepherd. Among them were former servants of the Shepherds, the undertaker who prepared the body of Mrs. McClintock for burial, a druggist who made up prescriptions for Mrs. McClintock in her last illness, and persons who had attended the funeral of Billy McClintock.
