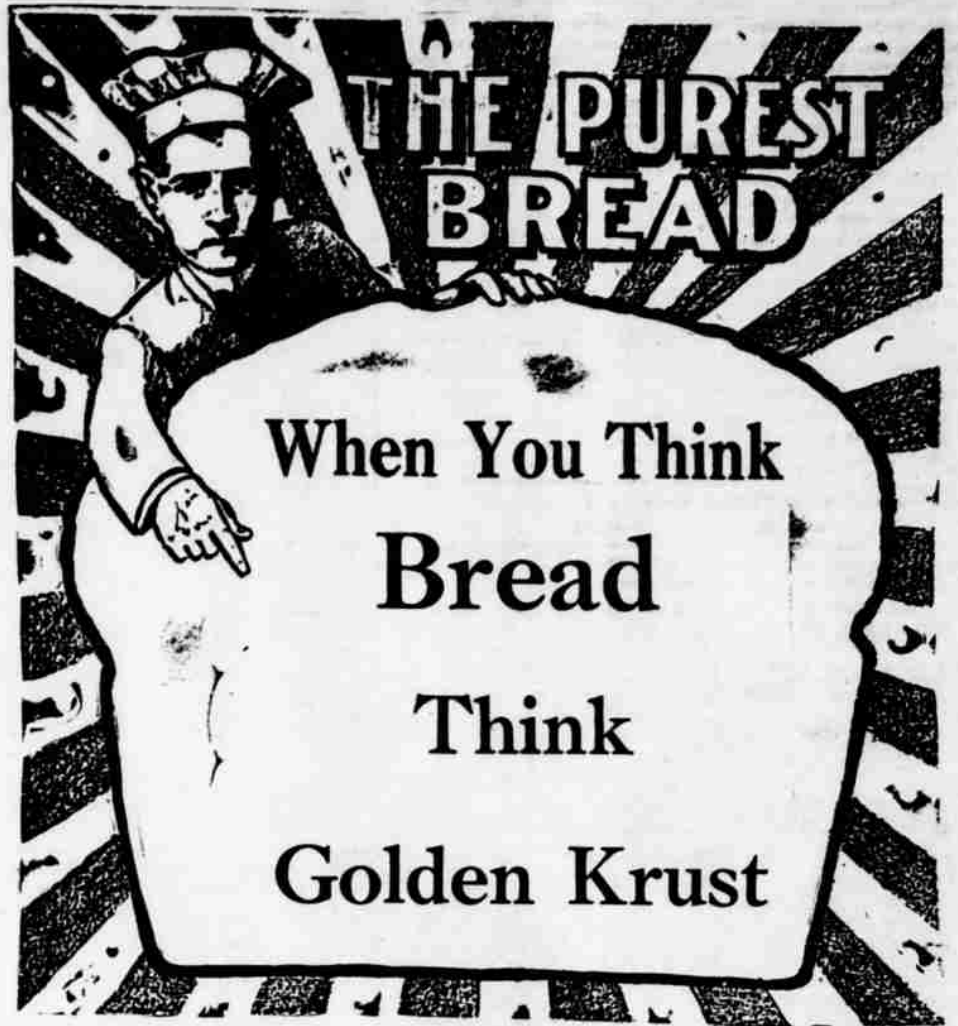

CY REDS, BATTLING GIANTS FOR FIRST PLACE, LOSE IN 12TH INNING

Cincinnati Reds, under the leadership of Adolfo Luque, their pitcher, threatened Thursday to become serious contenders for the National League championship. The Reds, who have won 11 of their last 12 games, lost to the St. Louis Cardinals, 4 to 3, in a game that lasted 12 innings. Luque, who has been the Reds' ace pitcher, pitched a brilliant game, allowing only three runs, two earned, and one unearned. He struck out 11 batters and walked only one. The Cardinals, who are in first place, won the game on a home run by Ed Delmonico in the 12th inning. The Reds, who are in second place, have a record of 21 wins and 17 losses.

The patriarchs of the ringside, who were sniffing resin when Jack McAuliffe was a boy, say that Young Griffo in his day, was the cleverest boxer that ever lived.

With that settled, where does Joe Gans come in? And Jim Corbett, and Jem Driscoll, Abe Attell, Freddie Welsh, Packey McFarland, Jack Britton, Mike Gibbons, Jimmy Wilde, and Eddit Campi?

To anyone who now meets Griffo for the first time, late in his life when he has bulged out to 175 pounds or so, with three chins flapping around his neck-band, it is simply incredible that this unlovely wreck of a man could have been fast enough to dodge a mop. But the transformation is only a deception, for Griffo was the only boxer who could give a fast hitter a free throw at his nose and make him miss, without moving his feet.

With no intention of settling an argument, but rather with the desire to start a good one, you might ask one of those liath, how the other clever men would rang.

The clients who have been going to fights only for the last 10 or 15 years have seen some marvelous demonstrations of the art of boxing.

The best exhibition that this set of lamps has ever gazed upon was the one that Jack Britton made against Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion, and a clever boxer, himself, lost by a foul in the eleventh round. Up to that time, Britton had thumped Leonard as calmly as a carpenter drives nails.

Wilde had perfect poise in the ring, and when he was crowded, when most men would have covered up or clinched, he turned matters by stabbing the other man on the nose with his left. One good stab deserved another from Jimmy, and by the time his left quit pumping he had delivered at least six, the last one being followed instantly by a right cross to the jaw.

On evidence and hearsay the runner-up to Young Griffo would seem to be Joe Gans. The ancients can always go into hysterics on short notice about the boxing of the Baltimore colored man, and Griffo must have been a pugilistic magician to rank above the man they called the "old master."

Charles Weiner, Cooper's manager, wanted Toby Irwin as the third man in the ring but finally consented to McGrath after Kearns threw out the "no fight" ultimatum. The welterweight champion's title is not involved in the bout, scheduled to go ten rounds at Ewing field.
