Sacramento Canyon To Be Open 15 Hours A Day On Saturday

The following announcement regarding the opening and closing of the Pacific highway, where construction is underway in the Sacramento river canyon, is made by the California highway commission:

Beginning Saturday, May 16th and continuing for the remainder of the summer, the Pacific highway between Halfway creek and Dog creek in the Sacramento river canyon, northern Shasta county, will be open to traffic at 7 a. m. and closed at 10 p. m. daily. From 10 p. m. to 7 a. m. the highway will be closed to all traffic. No detours are available.

On the whole, motorists will find traffic conditions between Hedding and the Oregon line improved over the 1924 season. Ten miles of new pavement are open to traffic and applications of calcium chloride are expected to keep the surfaced sections in good condition.

CALIF. MAN JOINS WITH BUNNELL FOR FEDERAL HELP ON MALIN ROAD SOUTH

C. J. Fulcher, of Lookout, Calif., president of The Dallas-Reno-Los Angeles highway association, and Peter Gerig, supervisor, of Belber, Calif., were visitors at the chamber of commerce yesterday in the interests of procuring federal aid for the northern California gap in the highway which leads south of Klamath Falls via Malin. According to the California road authorities the governor of California is expected to veto the recent legislation passed at Sacramento favorable to the above highway, and it is the desire of the Californians that the road be completed as a federal forest road in the event state aid is not forthcoming. The local chamber of commerce was pledged to assist Fulcher and Gerig in their efforts to procure the building of the highway with federal funds.

An eastern outlet for Klamath, Dr. Trout thought was not practical, since the N. C. O. would have to be practically rebuilt, owing to adverse curves and grades, and it would cost as much to standardize the N. C. O. as it would to build the 166-mile Modoc Northern. The completed line east around that way would be over 100 miles longer than the direct Modoc Northern outlet, the speaker said.

The Modoc Northern with another small gap constructed further south would make a through north and south line from central Oregon to Los Angeles, east of the mountains all the way. This would be a real military necessity, Dr. Trout said, since an enemy could destroy one tunnel on the present Southern Pacific over the Siskiyou, and thus cripple the entire railway transportation system of the coast between Seattle and Los Angeles.
