RIOT AT DEBS MEETING - MADISON SQUARE GARDEN

Mounted police rode into a crowd of 10,000 persons who stormed the doors of Madison Square Garden, New York, into which 15,000 others had already fought their way to hear Eugene V. Debs, former radical prisoner, defeated Socialist candidate for President, and citizen of Terre Haute, Ind., who spoke at the behest of the Women's Circle National Convention. Several women were hurt and one woman was trampled by a horse.

The prisoner, who said his name was Harry Hill, confessed the murder and is now serving a life sentence in Michigan Penitentiary, while Leo is free.

RIGID ECONOMY BEING ENFORCED

Senators And Members Of Supreme Court Can't Charge Taxi Fares

WASHINGTON, May 15.—One of the main legs in the economy machine here is J. R. McCarl, Comptroller general, who saves many dollars for Uncle Sam by his careful watch on the nation's bills.

Sticking closely to the letter of the law, McCarl has ruffled several cabinet members by his refusal to approve claims for expenditures of one kind and another. Several times they have been literally "sent to the back." Secretary of State Hughes had been in the cabinet but a few weeks when he felt the economy bite of McCarl, who decided that five dollars was all the government could contribute to tips listed by attaches under Kellogg's jurisdiction.

But McCarl rules supreme. He is responsible only to congress. It requires a joint resolution of congress to oust him. The president, even, cannot remove him. Appointed for a 15-year term under the budget act of 1921, he still has eleven years to serve.

McCarl's refusal to allow \$10 for a steward tip, was one incident of hundreds, which occur day in and day out. One month's "brop" of claims alone allowed more disallowed, fills a huge volume at the treasury, and runs the whole course of the vast government structure, from a taxicab of a public health service agent, to a city directory, purchased by the supreme court.

The high place occupied by the supreme court carries no weight with McCarl. The court had charged a city directory to its expense account. McCarl disallowed the claim, holding that a city directory

was a book of reference, and no specific appropriation had been made for this as a book of reference to congress.

Expense accounts of government agents, in one department and another, are clipped right and left. These form the major portion of claims. Taxicab fares are disallowed usually.

Ex-Mayor Escapes A Prison Sentence By Marriage To Girl

LOS ANGELES, May 15.—Fred Brown, son of ex-Mayor C. D. Brown of Rochester, Minn., escaped a long prison sentence under a white slave conviction here when he married Hattie Pritchett, 18-year-old St. Louis waitress he was charged with transporting to this city.

Brown pleaded guilty yesterday. At the same time he applied for probation, agreeing to marry the girl. Harry Shafer, who brought another girl here at the same time, pleaded guilty to the same indictment several weeks ago. He was sentenced to four years in prison. With the consent of United States Attorney S. W. McNabb, the ceremony was performed.

According to McNabb, Brown will be sentenced to five years in prison when he comes up for sentence. He then will be granted probation as long as he provides for the support of his wife and her baby, which is expected soon.
