PROFESSOR KILLS 3 AND THEN SUICIDES

NEW ORLEANS, May 15.—Bodies of the entire family of George W. Peckham, professor of philosophy at Newcomb college, were found Friday, when police broke into the Peckham home. Each body had a bullet hole in the left breast.

Although no details of the tragedy were known, the coroner decided that Peckham had committed suicide. Mrs. Eleanor Peckham, 36; Elizabeth, a seven-year-old daughter, and George, Jr., a two-year-old son, were the other victims.

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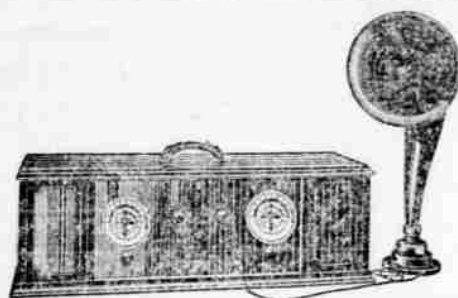
