K. F. MEMBERS OF WOODCRAFT BACK FROM G. P.

Mrs. Bess Ruonich, Mrs. Ivy Propst, Mrs. Ida Grimes, Mrs. Stella Sheets and Mrs. Fanny Thompson composed the delegation representing the local lodge of Neighbors of Woodcraft at the district convention held in Grants Pass last week.

This is the first time the local organization has been represented in the district convention since 1919, and it was represented to such good effect at this time that the members of the delegation carried off one of the district offices and landed a representative to the state convention, to be held in Portland June 24, besides having one of the delegation appointed as a member of the committee on credentials at the session.

Almost the first thing the delegation did was to have the words "Klamath Falls" printed on big bright red ribbons, which they wore continually, in order not to become confused with other delegations, and then they started in. Their first victory was achieved in the appointment of Mrs. Bess Ruonich to the committee on credentials.
