"POPPY DAY"

The Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion will observe Friday, May 29 as poppy day—a day set aside for the preservation of the sacred memories of those who made the supreme sacrifice in the World war, the Spanish war and other foreign wars.

To make General Pershing a United States senator would be to pull a great man from the heights.

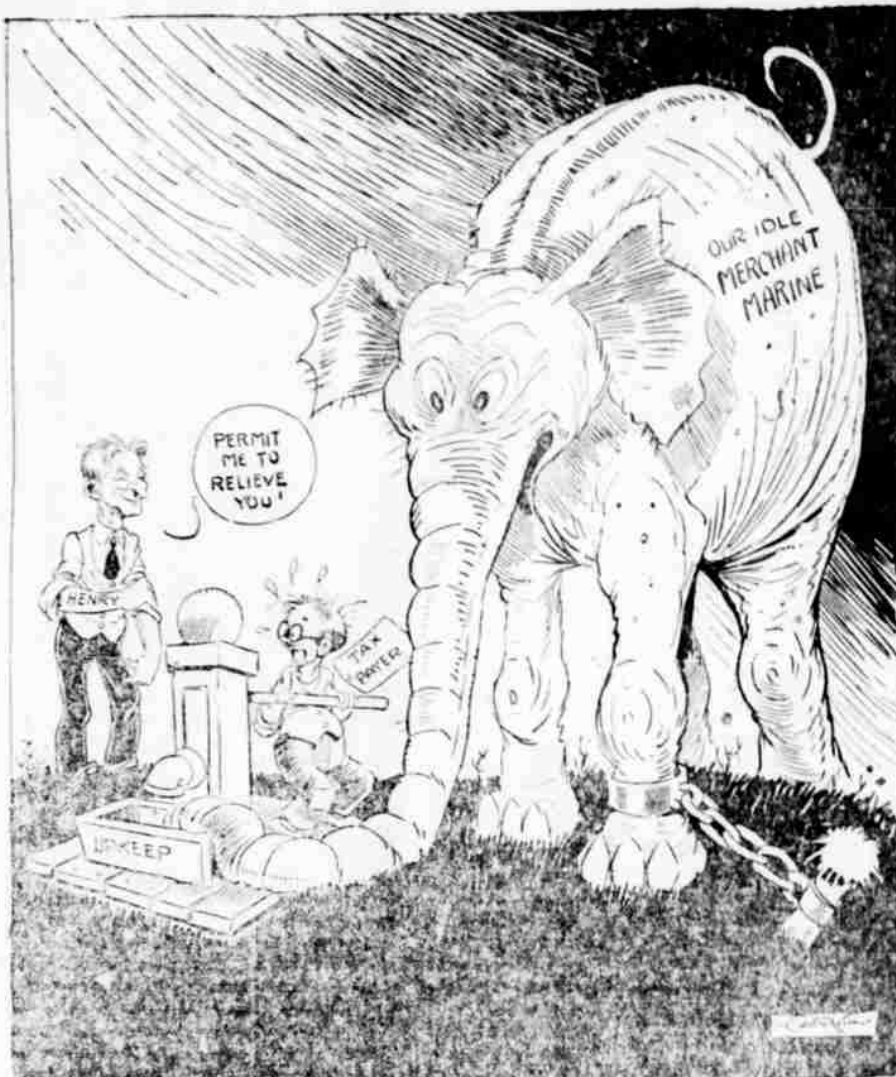
SEEING AMERICA FIRST

Growth of motor camping, both as a recreational and educational factor, has been so marked within recent years that 3000 communities in the nation have established camping areas. Some have as many as a dozen tourist parks, with the result that a complete list, including all the national and state forests preservations, would run over 10,000, according to the educational department of the national automobile chamber of commerce. While most of the motor campers journey individually or in groups of two or three cars, the Michigan automobile tours, under the auspices of the National Grange, will conduct an organized motor caravan of 200 cars and 800 travelers over a 2,000-mile route through the midwest and eastern states this year, starting from Battle Creek about August 5.

INDUSTRIAL FELLOWSHIP

Industrial fellowships are a new feature of the policy of international education which the American-Scandinavian Foundation has fostered since it was initially endowed by Niels Poulsen's gift of \$500,000. During the last five years 200 students of the arts, humanities and natural sciences have been interchanged. Eighteen prominent business and industrial companies of America have agreed to open their offices, factories and laboratories to practical students of Sweden nominated by the foundation. The program will be applied to Norway and Denmark as fast as possible. Every year 20 students have been exchanged with Sweden, 10 with Norway and 10 with Denmark.

Women Threaten To Go Bare Legged If Tariff On Silk Is Not Lowered

LONDON, May 21.—The desire of British women for silk stockings has won over the urgent need of the government for money.

Confronted with the opposition of hundreds of thousands of women to his plan to put a high protective tariff duty on raw and artificial silk, Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer has decided to lower the bars a bit. The duty on raw silk is to be approximately 75 cents instead of a dollar a pound and other imports containing silk will benefit.

TODAY'S RECIPES
Sponge Cake—Separate the yolks and whites of four eggs and beat light—first the whites, then the yolks. Add to the yolks a cup of granulated sugar and beat until light and creamy, and add one tablespoon lemon juice, the grated rind of the lemon and a pinch of salt. Sift one teaspoon baking powder with a cup of flour and add a third of the mixture to the egg and sugar, then a third of the stiffly beaten egg whites, then more flour, alternating until all are used. Fold in gently with a cutting down movement. Bake in moderate oven.

White Sauce Flavour—To add a delightfully piquant touch of flavor to white sauce for creaming potatoes or other "bland" food, put a

couple of onion sprouts in the butter and let cook until browned. Then remove the onion and use the butter.

SUGGESTIONS
 By breaking macaroni into a wire sieve and immersing this into a boiling water the food is just as thoroughly cleaned as by the old method. The water should be lifted out when the water drained off, the food is avoided and the food is to be served, there is no scorching.

CIGARETTE TAX BILL TO STAND AS PASSED

SALEM, May 21.—Sufficiency of the ballot title for the cigarette tax bill as prepared by Attorney General VanWinkle, was upheld by Circuit Judge McMahan in an order handed down today denying to C. C. Chapman, Portland, an injunction to stop the circulation of referendum petitions attacking the act of the last legislature providing for a tax on cigarettes tobacco and snuff.

The order of Judge McMahan pointed out that the appeal from the ballot title was not filed within the time specified by law and that to uphold the appeal at this late date would have the effect of rendering all signatures already obtained valueless and of defeating the purpose of the referendum.
