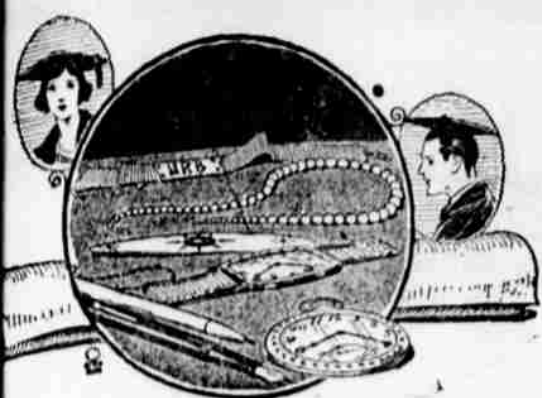

Snappy Sporting Notes

FLYING FINN TO TRY TO SHATTER ANOTHER RECORD

BOSTON, May 21.—The record-breaking Finn is to make his greatest effort Friday evening. On the fast Harvard stadium track about 7 p. m., the human running machine will attempt to shatter the world record for the one mile run, which he himself established in Switzerland in 1923.

If Nurmi runs as he is expected to run, there is little doubt that he will smash the American record of 4:12 2-3, made by Norman Taber on the Harvard track 10 years ago. Coaches of greater Boston colleges who have followed the flying Finn's American campaign against indoor marks are inclined to think he will lower his own mark of 4:10 2-5. Nurmi himself, never over-confident, says he will run a "good mile."

Major Fred W. Moore, graduate manager of athletics at Harvard, is in charge of the race. As no admission is to be charged, he is making arrangements to handle a crowd of thirty or forty thousand.

Nurmi is to have three opponents, Jimmy Connolly, former intercollegiate mile champion; Tom Clauson, of the Boston Athletic association, and Billy Dooley of Cambridge. All four will run from scratch. Connolly is the only one expected to give the Finn any competition after the early stages of the race.

If weather conditions are not perfect for a fast race Friday evening, Nurmi will remain over to make his effort in connection with the Harvard-Princeton dual meet Saturday afternoon.

GIANTS KEEP UP WINNING STREAK BEATING BUCKS

The Giants, who had lost but two games out of 12 during the invasion of the Polo Grounds by western teams, added another victory to their long list Thursday by defeating the Pirates, the fourth team to compete with the New Yorkers since the inter-sectional clashes began, 5 to 4. The Pirates had done well in the east, better than any other western club, and it was Bill McKechnie's ambition to raise the standing a bit more by taking down the league leaders. In the fifth inning there was a chance, the Pirates putting over three runs, but the Giants tightened up and won.

The victory gave the Giants a record of 23 victories and seven defeats; while Pittsburgh remained in a tie for fourth place with the Cincinnati Reds, who lost a game to the Phillies, 9 to 1.

The Brooklyn Dodgers won over the Cubs, 5 to 4, thus maintaining their place along with Philadelphia, just behind New York. Boston defeated St. Louis 12 to 3.

It was track meet for the Athletics at St. Louis, where they piled up 20 runs to the Browns' four. Five pitchers went to the mound for the home team, but the Mackmen continued to run across home plate at will.

The Senators made up for the defeat of Wednesday, by winning from the Tigers at Detroit, 6 to 2. Walter Johnson allowed but seven hits. Muddy Ruel was back behind the plate again.

The Yanks won a game in Cleveland, 6 to 3, hitting up 11 hits. Boston won from Chicago, 9 to 7.
