Dorothy Is A Puzzle;

Don't Know Whether To Plead Guilty Or What

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—Further steps in the state's murder case against Dorothy Ellingson hinge upon the young matricide's plea when brought into court here tomorrow.

A desire to end the sordid affair as quickly as possible was shown today by District Attorney Matthew Brady and by Dr. J. M. Scanland, whose report that Dorothy is not insane, reopened the entire case.

Brady said that he would recommend a curative institution for Dorothy if she pleads guilty to the charge of killing her mother. Dr. Scanland, medical superintendent of the Napa state hospital, declared that the girl should be treated for "abnormal social behavior" instead of being sent to prison.

Dorothy, who filled her life with drinking orgies, all-night dancing parties, and intimacies with jazz-crazed young men, killed her mother in a fit of anger at being chided for her continued dissipation. She was 16 years old at the time, and a familiar figure in San Francisco's haunts of vice.

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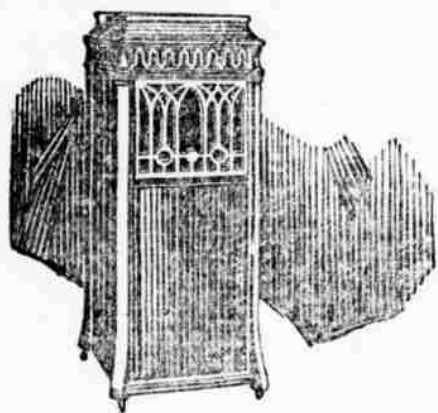
